Panthers cruise past Towns, visit Fannin in battle of unbeatens Friday

Union County took care of business in the home opener, setting up a Friday night clash with undefeated Fannin County in Blue Ridge.

Things went as expected in the Panthers' 60-7 victory over Towns County as Union scored nine touchdowns before the Indians found the end zone in the final minutes to prevent the shutout. The 60-point outburst

marks the highest scoring performance a rivalry that has seen the Panthers prevail in 31 of 32 Union County Head

Football Coach Brian Allison was impressed with the Indians' never-say-die attitude, despite entering Friday night's contest with barely 20 players. "Those guys played their

hearts out and never quit,' Coach Allison said. "My hat's off to them. They showed a lot of heart and toughness and played hard the entire game." As for his own squad,

the Panthers scored on its first five possessions to open up a 35-0 lead with 8:18 left in the second quarter. Over the same time-span,

the Union County defense allowed just one first down, which came via a pass interference penalty on the game's third play. After the defense forced

a punt, junior running back Jonah Daniel broke free for a 31-yard touchdown run on the Panthers' second play.

Later, Pierson Allison would hit a wide-open Sawyer Drake on a deep post route over the middle for a 26-yard touchdown pass.

On the next offensive possession, Union County made it 21-0 when Kyle Morlock took a screen-pass 27 yards for the score that was sprung by the downfield blocking of sophomore wide out Dalton Allen.

Early in the second quarter, junior Mason McCombs took a tunnel screen at the 15yard line and went untouched into the end zone for a 28-0

The varsity's final score of the evening came on a 22yard keeper by Pierson Allison, who weaved his way through traffic before splitting a pair of Indians at the 5-yard line.

The Panthers were aided by a pair of short fields on its final two scores as Towns County was twice denied on fourth down, deep in its own territory.

ended with 90 yards and three Panthers inside the Indians' red scores on 5-of-7 passing. He also added one rushing score and 31 yards on two carries.

We did what we needed to do to," Coach Allison said regarding the win. "I thought we made some improvements in a few areas. Our offensive line had some quality reps, and the same thing with the defensive line, I thought we did some good things.

Sophomore quarterback Logan Helcher took over midway through the second quarter and led a three-play, 42-yard scoring drive, capped off by a 39-yard catch-and-run by Allen, who hauled in a corner route at the 20 and stiff-armed a defender at the 10 before finally dragging him across the

On its final scoring drive of the half, a 16-yard punt return by Josh Orr set up Helcher and the offense just 27 yards away from pay dirt.

A pair of carries by freshman Caleb Rogers moved Union County inside the 10yard line, where freshman Stein Harkins finished off the drive with back-to-back hand offs up the gut -- the second one finding the end zone from four

Most of his damage came in the second half, however, as he stretched the Union lead to 54-0 on a 6-yard scoring run on the opening drive of the third quarter.

Up next - Union County will face 2-0 Fannin County on Friday in a battle of the unbeatens in a rivalry that dates back to the 1950s. Since East and West

Fannin were consolidated into Fannin County High School in the late 1970s, the Panthers are 14-13 against their next-door On seven occasions

since 2000, Union County has entered the Fannin game undefeated. On six occasions they

On the final play of the left undefeated with the lone exception coming in 2013 the Rebels' last victory in

Only twice have both teams entered without a blemish and the two meetings came in back-to-back seasons (2000-2001) when they were both 1-0. Union County would win both games easily, including a 36-0 shutout at Fannin in

In 1991, Fannin entered 7-0 and throttled a 2-4 Panthers squad 36-6. In each contest between 2006-2008, Fannin came in sporting a 4-1 mark and won all three

The only competitive meeting during that stretch came in 2008, when Union was also 4-1, and Fannin held on 42-35 in Blue Ridge.

More recently, the 2-1 Rebels hosted a pair of 3-0 Panther teams in 2014 and 2015. Following a Union rout in 2014, Fannin took the Panthers down to the wire a year later in Blue Ridge, a game that saw Union rally late for a

37-31 victory.

Despite a 63-39 victory in their last visit to Fannin County in 2016, Coach Allison expects a nail-biter when his Panthers invade Blue Ridge on Friday night.

"I think it's going to be a barn-burner," he said. "Both teams will be fired-up so I think we need to make sure we do a great job and execute in practice this week."

What worries Coach Allison is an extremely versatile Rebels offense that throws multiple sets at the opposition to keep its defense guessing and off-balance. "The reason [Fannin] is

so tough is because they can go from a Pro-I (formation) to a spread while using the same personnel. That makes them very tough to prepare for."

He feels a little better

about his offense's capability to put up points.

"I think we match up pretty well [with Fannin's defense], but once again, it comes down to execution and how well we're able to do what we're supposed to do."
