

Volleyball: Union makes quick work of Banks, Elbert on Senior Night

Area play got underway last Thursday with a pair of one-sided victories over Elbert County and Banks County on Senior Night.

Hosting the area tri-match, Union County opened with Elbert County, dismantling the first-year program in set one, 25-8.

Set two was a bit more competitive, but the Panthers were never threatened in a 25-15

"We were excited to see Elbert since they are a beginning program," said Union County head coach Anna Chapman, who missed last week's action due to illness, giving way to assistant coach Seth Merritt. "This happens to make for a tough match even when you don't expect it. Elbert tested us and caught us with a slower pace of game. We

had to return to the basics and remember to be ready all the time. The ball can come over after the first ball and it's important that we stay on our toes. The girls pulled out a great win in the end

Morgan Fussell, along with sophomore Saylor Noe recorded three kills apiece.

Sophomore Sofia Swartz added two kills in the win.

Molly Kay West recorded a match-high eight aces. Haley Noe had four aces and Allison

Swartz and Allison had one block.

In the nightcap vs. Banks County, Union outscored the Leopards 12-1 in set one to turn a 4-4 tie into a 16-5 rout. The Panthers would cruise to a 25-13

The second set saw Union break things open following a 3-3 start, eventually opening up an 18-7 advantage. Once again, the Panthers coasted to a 25-13

"This is the second time Juniors Riley Allison and against Banks and we were ready for another round of solid play but were confident in our skills," Chapman said. "The girls showed amazing court coverage, court awareness, and incredible stats for the night. We are proud to be 2-0 for (Area) play right

Fussell had five kills and Allison added three vs. Banks. Haley and Saylor Noe chipped in two apiece, Olivia Blocker had one West, Whicker and Haley

Noe picked up three aces each. Saylor Noe added two. Haley Noe also recorded seven digs.

Davis scored Roxbury with a base hit; Jones scored the courtesy runner Karnes with a single and Collins walked to load the bases.

Patton singled to center,

scoring Davis, then an outfield error allowed three more runs to come around.

Sisum's homer made it an 8-0 game, and later, Roxbury singled and advanced to second on a wild pitch, setting the table for Banton to make it 9-0 on an RBI single.

Burnette got the nod and worked three perfect innings, striking out five. Tracy entered in the fourth and struck out three and walked one over two

Sisum finished 1-for-3 with her second homer of the vear: Patton was 1-for-1 with an RBI, a run and two walks Roxbury scored twice during a 1-for-1, two-walk performance and Banton went 2-for-2 with a pair of ribbies. Burnette was 2-for-3; Davis and Jones each finished 1-for-2 and Collins scored a run while going

Karnes went 1-for-1 and atie Byers added a run.

Up next: Union County visits Elbert County on Tuesday and Rabun County on Thursday as they wrap up their first trip through Region 8-AA. Both games are scheduled to begin at 5:30 p.m.

The Panthers offense would suffer a three-and-out and Commerce put the game away with a nine-play, 65-yard drive that opened up a 32-14 lead with 11:01 remaining.

The game-sealing drive was capped off by a 13-yard scoring run, coming on the heels of two third-down conversions - a 9-yard run on third-and-7 and a 6-yard carry on third-and-6.

"Commerce is a top-10 team and we only gave up seven points in the second half." Allison said. "It's coming. Our goal is to get better each week and I feel like we're a better football team now than we were a week ago. If we can continue making these strides I feel like we'll be in good

Union County was turned away on fourth-and-2 from the 28, but Commerce put the ball on the turf five plays later. With the game all but decided at this point, both squads began rotating in the reserves.

The Panthers got on the board first with a scoop-andscore by Elijah Helton. In Week 1, Helton, a.k.a. Mr. Right-Place-At-The-Right-Time forced a fumble that led to a Dalton Allen touchdown vs. Fannin County.

Just past the midway point of the opening frame at Commerce, Conner Cook slipped into the backfield and jarred the football loose from the Tigers quarterback. Elijah Helton was the benefactor this time as he scooped up the pigskin and raced 45 yards in the other direction.

"We've worked on some turnover circuits, especially in fall practice," Allison said. "Both times the ball happened to bounce right into our hands, but they came as a result of our defense forcing the fumble and not an

unforced error."

Commerce needed just three plays to pull within a point at 7-6 when a third-and-5 toss sweep turned into a 70-yard scoring run.

That's been the story in both games this year: We play good then give up a big play," Al-
