



make or break their postseason

Coming off a 6-1 loss to Banks County last week, the Lady Panthers desperately need wins at Rabun County on Tuesday and vs Oglethorpe County on Thursday.

Two wins will give Union the No. 4 seed and home field advantage for its first round region playoff series. One loss and they could drop to No. 5, where they would likely travel to Elbert County or Oglethorpe County in round one.

The worst-case scenario would be two losses and the No. 6 seed, earning Union County a trip to No. 3 seed Banks County.

second round of region. Awaiting the 4/5 winner is top seed Monticello, who has already clinched the regular season Region 8-AA title. As a result, the Hurricanes have punched their ticket to state by way of a first round bye in the region tourney.

Social Circle is currently the No. 2 seed and was scheduled to play Union County two weeks ago. Last Thursday, Oglethorpe County made the trip to Blairsville, only to watch Mother Nature continue to torment Region 8-AA in the form of a pop-up thunder shower that washed away the UCHS softball field in a matter of minutes.

The Oglethorpe game, and its Senior Night festivities, have been rescheduled for Thursday. As for Social Circle, that contest is currently slated for Sept. 24, only if the region standings can be influenced by the result.

"I don't want them to have to drive back up here for a meaningless game," Union County Head Coach Stephen Mitchell said.

Over the weekend, the Lady Panthers got in five games at the Morgan County Tournament in Madison. Union would finish the tournament with a 1-4 record but end," Mitchell said. Coach Mitchell chalks it up to the level of competition.
