#### Metanoia

Have you heard about the "red pill" phenomenon? A growing number of people are announcing on social media their rejection of the political correctness, identity politics, and victimhood of their past. They don't buy it anymore. In the movie "The Matrix," the hero could take a blue pill and remain in the artificial world, or the red pill where he comes to reality.

That people can experience a paradigm shift is not new. The ancient Greek language has a word, "metanoia," that means to rethink something, change your mind, and turn away. Os Guinness in his book "Fool's Talk," explains that for the

Christian "it signifies the complete about-face of heart, mind, thought and life that triggers conversion and initiates the migration from one reality to another – from the kingdom of darkness to the kingdom of light."

The Hebrew Scripture has the salacious story of King David taking Uriah's wife Bathsheba. He tried to cover it up, then had Uriah killed. The prophet Nathan knew it, and came to David explaining that a rich man stole a poor man's sole lamb. Outraged, David ruled that the culprit must die. Nathan cut him with, "You are the man!" On the spot, David admitted, "I have sinned against the Lord" (2 Sam. 12). Jesus told a story about a wealthy man whose son demanded his inheritance. The son squandered it all with loose living. After he took a lowly job feeding swine, he came to his senses. He re-thought his situation and returned to his father, who welcomed him back with open arms. David and the prodigal son experienced "metanoia."

Repentance is one of those mysterious places where the love of God and the will of man intersect. On the one hand it is a gift: "God may grant them repentance leading to the knowledge of the truth" (2 Tim. 2:25); "God has granted to the Gentiles also the repentance to life" (Acts 11:18). On the other, it is a command: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matt. 4:17). To grasp this, you must know that repentance is not just trying to live right. Billy Graham said, "It is a simple recognition of what we are. We see ourselves as God sees us, and we say "God be merciful to me a sinner" (Luke 18:13). Steve McVey explains,

group and their efforts to make this project happen. Q. You had a real estate transaction that you announced at the county meeting. Can

A. Yes, the Jenkins Family owns property between Georgia 515 and the Farmers Market property. The transaction that was negotiated with the Jenkins family involved property exchanges. The Jenkins family transferred to the county .90 acres of their property that protruded into the middle of the Farmers Market property. They also gave the County a .23-acre tract that was across from the end of the Glen Gooch Bypass at the traffic light beside Wendy's, which gives the county direct access to the traffic-light intersection. The County in turn transferred to the Jenkins family a 1.02-acre piece of property that was long, narrow and did not provide benefit to the county. It did provide a very good addition to the Jenkins property. We want to thank the Jenkins family for working with the county so that we were able to trade properties for the mutual benefit of each owner.

Q. Did the county have to pay any additional money for the Jenkins real estate trade?

A. Yes, we did. The county paid the Jenkins family \$35,000 in additional compensation for the tracts of land that were swapped based on the highway frontage-traffic light intersection access we


"only drugs" is hazardous, the combination of the two can be a recipe for disaster.

#### A New Ax and Saw

Coon was born to Lon and Laura Cummings in July of 1915. He married the love of his life, Glenna Mae, in 1936. The young couple lived in the "weaning off house" just a short distance from his parents. Just like his father, Papa, made his living off the land.

Not long after their marriage, his father Lon came to see him one evening. It seems that a man named Nix from Phil Campbell was trying



to sell some land across the branch and through the woods about half a mile from Lon's place. The man offered to sell the land to Papa and a couple of brothers and brother-in-law. Papa and those men went into debt to buy 80 acres of land each from

He was so worried because he owed a whopping \$80. He told me he had difficulty sleeping at night due to the worry about paying off that land.

Lon was proud of his sons for making their first land purchase. Little did he realize that Coon would be the only one to not only hold onto his land, but he would enlarge his purchase as well. Papa and Granny went right to work on that land. But, before he could work on the land he had to purchase some tools. Papa ordered a couple of items from the Sears & Roebuck Company. He bought a double bit axe, which cost him an arm and a leg. Recently, I acquired a replica 1927 catalogue from the Sears Company. That axe cost my grandfather \$2.25. At the same time he also ordered a crosscut saw. The saw cost him \$2.95 while the handles and hardware cost another .50. He also purchased a 14foot logging chain for \$3.90. He was now ready to

Papa and Granny spent the next 5-7 years clearing their land. They cut down and hauled away most of the smaller trees. But, the larger trees they girdled and left them standing. Girdling is a process where the lower 3

1/2 feet of bark is stripped from the bottom of the

The young couple plowed around the standing timber. After a few years the standing timber fell to the ground and it was used for firewood. Papa made enough money on his crop to pay for his first 80 acres in a 5-year period. However, the story of the saw continued.

Papa also used the saw to cut timber for his house. Granny and Papa cut the logs and then hauled them to a mill to be converted into lumber. All this was hard work, which was done between trying to get a crop of cotton ready to gin and raising two sons. But, they soon had a roof up with only a few of the walls covered. They used poplar, oak and pine lumber to build their new home. Since it was summer time the young family moved

#### **Storm damage to trees**

With all the news of fires in the Northwest. I'm sure we're all reminded of the horrible wildfires we faced last year. While we have had much more rain this year, wildfires are natural parts of the Appalachian ecosystem so we are always at

risk. İt is important to always make sure your home is as protected from fire as possible, because it could take minutes for a home to be ru-



Always ensure that a 30-foot perimeter around your house is cleared of any excess vegetation. This critical area is known as the "home defensible zone" and needs to have as little flammable material as possible. If you have any outbuildings such as sheds, garages or guest houses, this perimeter extends to them as well. Plants are obviously some of the most flammable things homeowners can have in this zone, but responsible landscaping can reduce the risk. Keep plants such as bushes and trees appropriately pruned and prevent them from becoming overgrown and too close to the house and roof. When you do prune, remove all trimmings, and rake away any leaf litter. This is especially important around evergreens such as Leyland cypress and arborvitae because they drop large amounts of needles throughout the year that are highly flammable

If you are landscaping, opt for stone and brick materials as opposed to wooden rail ties or other flammable materials. Also, though it may be convenient to have your firewood pile right next to the back door, especially on cold nights, it's incredibly dangerous to have such a flammable area near your home. All firewood piles should be placed outside of the defensible zone and far away from any propane tanks, which should also have a 10-foot perimeter cleared around them maintained with gravel when possible.

Though many of us strive to keep the natural forest areas around our home, forested areas on our properties still require some maintenance. Be aware of the vertical arrangement of vegetation. This means take down any vines, dead trees that have fallen against live trees, and shrubby weeds that grow around trunks. These cause what are known as "fire ladders," which allow fire to spread along the ground and up trees that would otherwise have not caught if the ground

It is equally important to make sure that your house itself is as fireproof as possible, which can be done with some easy modifications if you are in the process of updating your home. Residing your home with brick or stone and re-roofing with class A shingles or other non-flammable
