Blairsville native Robby Brown returns to NFL as Miami QB Coach

Miami Gardens, FL The Miami Dolphins have searched high and low for the next Dan Marino or Bob Griese for more than two decades, but the wait feels more like two centuries to the Super Bowlstarved city.

Following the Dolphins' 5-11 campaign a year ago, Robby Brown, a 1999 Union County High School graduate, was brought to Miami to serve as the team's quarterback coach under second-year coach Brian Flores and incoming offensive coordinator Chan Gailey.

With a pair of potential franchise quarterbacks (LSU's Joe Burrow and Alabama's Tua Tagovailoa) within reach of Miami's fifth overall pick in last spring's NFL Draft, Flores tabbed Brown as the potter assigned with molding the QBclay entrusted to erase 35 years of gridiron-agony in South Florida.

Brown, who played quarterback under Gailey at Georgia Tech, knew that he couldn't turn down his former coach when Gailey notified him that the Dolphins were interested.

"I remember that day (very well)," Brown said. "I got a text from Coach Gailey, it didn't have any details, it just said, 'can you talk in a little while?"

Gailey told Brown that Coach Flores would be reaching out very soon. Something the former Union County quarterback didn't see coming.

"I was shocked. I had just moved to West Virginia and only been there seven months," said

"So I definitely wasn't expecting it."

Instantly, Brown broke the news to his wife and asked her opinion. But, in truth, his mind was already made up.

"This was actually the first time that I've said 'yes' (to a job) without sitting down and having the husband-wife conference with her," Brown laughingly admitted. "She was sick and lying in bed with the flu, but she was excited for me. We had discussed it after I got the text from Coach Gailey, so she knew something was up.

in Broward (County), about 45 minutes north of Miami, pretty close to the facilities (in Miami Gardens).'

As for his seven months in West Virginia, Brown had no intention of leaving and enjoyed working with old colleagues from his days at Troy University.

"I was around a bunch of friends, a lot of guys I started in the business with, and they are all good people," he said. "We weren't looking to leave, but (Miami) was an opportunity that I couldn't pass up.'

With Brown arriving in the Sunshine State months ahead "We like it a lot (in South of the draft, the upcoming pick took on added significance for the brand new QB coach hoping to deliver Miami its first

As expected, the Heisman Trophy winner Burrow went first overall to Cincinnati, so the Dolphins handed the keys to Tagovailoa with the No. 5 pick.

However, the pressure isn't squarely on the 2018 College Football Playoff National Championship Offensive MVP with the Dolphins adding freeagent QB Ryan Fitzpatrick, who's familiar with Brown and Gailey after the trio spent two seasons together with the New York Jets (2015-2016).

"I believe you learn something everywhere you go, so that will help [me coach both] of those guys," Brown said, discussing what he learned from each of his coaching stops and what he brings to Miami as a result. "It's always good to try and learn something and take a little bit of information from whoever that may be."

Prior to West Virginia,

Brown spent four seasons in New York, working on both sides of the ball under former Jets head coach Todd Bowles. During his first two years, Brown worked as an Offensive Quality Control assistant under thenoffensive coordinator Gailey before switching to the defensive side in 2017.

"I learned a lot being around [Bowles], he's good people," Brown said. "He's a very intelligent coach. I had never coached defense before so that was a lot of fun to learn from him and listen to how he sees things from the defense's perspective. I don't know how much that will help [in Miami] but I hope it does.

In the meantime, he hasn't set any goals or given much thought to what he would consider a successful season.

"I just want to go out there and do the very best I can do for Coach Flores, Coach Gailey and our quarterbacks," he said.

For most Dolphins fans, Brown enters as an unknown. So when asked to summarize himself in one sentence, Brown said he just wants to be defined as a God-fearing, blue-collar guy from Blairsville.

'I'm proud of where I'm from and I think that shapes you into who you become," he said. "Whether it's [something you learn at] First Baptist Church or Coach (Brian) Allison teaching you toughness or something from your mom and dad. Both of my parents are hard workers, so I'm proud of where I come from and proud of the people that influenced my life and helped me become who I am as an everyday person."

He also credited Coach Allison for providing a solid foundation to his coaching career

'[Allison and I] used to meet in the morning, and we'd go over the run game and the run checks; he was just a smart football coach," Brown said regarding his high school days. "[Allison] has won [at Union County] running three different offenses and he does what his guys can do best. He always taught toughness and how to play the game the right way, so playing for him was a big learning experience when I was at a time in my life when you're still learning how to do things."

The Dolphins are currently 1-2 on the year following two narrow losses to start the year. Miami cracked the win column in Week 3 with a 31-13 Thursday night victory at Jacksonville.


