## Defense sparks fourth quarter surge as Panthers improve to 6-0

After surrendering the eighth-most points in school history during a 74-57 win at Putnam County, the muchmaligned Union County defense preserved the 8th ranked Panthers' perfect record with an A-plus performance during the second half of Friday's 35-14 victory over Elbert County

In a season dominated by record-breaking offensive statistics and highlight-reel performances, the Union County defense used four fourth quarter turnovers to light a spark under a stagnant offense that went on to outscore the Blue Devils 28-0 over the game's final 16

"Our defense played excellent tonight," senior wide re-ceiver Sawyer Drake said after the game. "They kept getting us the ball back at the end. Three turnovers in-a-row, it doesn't get any better than that." Fresh off a positive week

of practice, Union County head coach Brian Allison was confident that his defense was primed for a bounce-back per-"I thought our guys did

a nice job defensively after the week before, and coming in, I kind of felt like they would," he said. "Holding a team like Elbert to only 14 points is a really big turnaround."

Early on, the Panthers (6-0, 3-0) were dealt a punch to the gut when the team's leading receiver Kyle Morlock was lost to a broken ankle on the first play of the game.

With Morlock out, Drake stepped up and provided a career-high 169 receiving yards to go with seven grabs and two

"I hate it for Kyle, he is one of the best football players that I've ever played with, and it's just a tough situation," Drake said. "We knew coming in that it was going to be a tight ball game so it feels really great to come out on top after a hardfought battle like that.'

However, it took a while for Drake and the shellshocked offense to shake the loss of Morlock as they went scoreless on their first four possessions son's first interception of the

The offense would come to life just in time to even the score at halftime on a 19-yard touchdown catch by Cayden Rich, but Elbert responded with a 12-play, 69-yard drive to retake the lead at 14-7 on the opening series of the third quarter.

"I think the injury (to Morlock) affected our mindset quite a bit but getting that touchdown before the half was huge," Coach Allison said. "That score got our offense back into the flow and it gave us some momentum going into halftime. I don't know what it was that flipped (the switch) right there, I'd like to say it was adjustments, but maybe we just started playing a harder with a little more intensity and urgency, because early on, we

were having a hard time." Tied at 14-14 following

a 21-yard touchdown run by Jonah Daniel, Elbert County kept its ensuing drive alive by converting a 3rd-and-14 from its own 36. As the fourth quarter got underway, the Blue Devils' running attack was on the move with runs of 6, 6, 7 and 10-yards against a weary Panther defense that had spent all but 115 seconds of the second and third quarters on the field.

Faced with a first down from its own 21-yard line, the Union defense dug deep and made a play that proved to be the pivotal moment of the game, and potentially the

With the quarterback rolling right towards the boundary, junior safety Kaston Hemphill came charging in and jarred the ball loose, then had the whereabouts to quickly dive on the football before it rolled out-of-bounds.

"I believe that play was the turning point," Coach Allison said. "He not only forced the fumble but he recovered it himself, that was obviously the play of the game."

With an opportunity to take its first lead of the contest, turnover-free football from the the offense immediately went Blue Devil offense. to work from the 33-yard line. option pitch for 22 yards after being held to only 3 rushing yards in the first half.

Even with the 21-0 dart to Drake on a post pattern fourth quarter, Elbert did a nice job of keeping the Union County offense on the sidelines. The final play-count tally saw the Blue Devils' offense run 77 plays to only 45 for Union -- its lowest total since last year's Social Circle game that featured a running clock the entire second half after the Panthers led 42-0.

Meanwhile, Union County's 121 rushing yards was its lowest mark in a regular-season game since last year's Elbert County game

After getting bottled up Starting from the Blue in the first half, Daniel finished with solid numbers of 72 yards and a score on 10 carries. He

Despite starting only 4-for-10, Pierson Allison ended up 15-for-23 with 327 yards, four touchdowns and an interception. He also gained 37 yards on five carries.

McCombs finished his day with three grabs for 80 yards and a score; Rich had one catch for 19 yards and a touchdown; Zion Ross caught one pass for 11 yards and Morlock picked up four on his only
