Panthers drop third straight, 52-21 to Dawson County

With the bye week approaching, Union looks for first region win Friday at North Hall

Dawson County (4-2, 2-0) outscored the Panthers 24-0 in the second quarter before reeling off 28-unanswered in the third to open up a 52-7 lead heading into the fourth.


The loss is Union's third straight overall and second straight at home after opening the season 4-0. The Panthers must win each of the final three games to extend its state tournament streak to five years.

"We've played three really good teams in-a-row and have been dealing with adversity," Head Coach Brian Allison said. "The injuries have been continuous and it's just been one of those years that you hate to see come along, but it happens every now and again. On Friday night, both of-

fenses were unable to find any traction in the early going as the first three offensive possessions ended with punts. With 4:07 left in the first and still no score, the Tigers took over at their own 22 following Union's second punt of the quarter. A first down penalty brought up a 1st-and-15 where senior Cole Dockrey picked off a Coey Watson pass at the 25-yard line and returned it to the 12.

On 2nd-and-9 from the 11. Wright picked up nine with his legs to set up first-and-goal at the two. A first down give to Chad Buzzard was good for a yard, then Wright hit Sawyer Drake in the front corner of the end zone for six.

On the ensuing Dawson possession, the Panthers were called for defensive holding on 3rd-and-4, and later, the Tigers gained 26 on 3rd-and-1. As the first quarter came to a close, Dawson was looking at firstand-goal from the four. After rushing for three on first down, the defense was able to drop the Tigers for a 5-yard loss. On third down from the six, Watson mis-

With 10:55 to play in the half, Union was clinging to a 7-3

The Panthers responded by driving into Dawson territory with a 43-yard completion to Chayton Schafer. On first down from the 39, Buzzard was stopped behind the line for a loss of five. An incompletion on second down and an offsides penalty on third moved Union back to its original line of scrimmage, but another incomplete pass brought junior Brian Smith onto the field to attempt a school

record 56-yard field goal. The kick had plenty of distance, clearing the top of the uprights, but it barely missed wide left. Distance-wise, the kick would've been good from 65 yards but Smith pulled it slightly to the left.

"For nearly two quarters fired into the end zone, bringing I thought we played really well

against a good, physical football team," Allison said. "Right now, size-wise, we've ran into three physical football teams and that's really hurt us.'

The Tigers would regain possession and used a 20-yard completion and a Union pass interference penalty to move inside the 30-yard line. Five plays later, Dawson took the lead with a 17-yard touchdown run with 6:07 left in the second.

The next six touchdowns would also belong to the Ti-

A Union three-and-out gave the ball back to Dawson with 5:17 on the clock and they needed nine plays to move 60 yards and extend their lead to

On the ensuing Panther possession, a delay of game penalty on third down led to another three-and-out. This time, the Tigers took over at midfield

following the punt with 2:28 before halftime. On the sixth play of the

drive, a 25-yard touchdown pass opened up a 24-7 lead at The Union defense began the second half by forcing a

punt but two sacks derailed the offense's hopes of slicing into the 17-point deficit. Taking over at their own

38, the Tigers needed eight plays to move 62 yards and pull ahead After another Union punt,

a 53-yard touchdown run at the 5:40 mark made it 38-7, then with 5:12 left in the third, Dawson blocked a punt and returned

The Tigers tacked on one more score with 55 seconds left in the third to cap off a 52-0 stretch over the second and third

the fourth, Wright and Kanon Hemphill connected for a 7-yard score with 7:03 to play. Later, Pierson Allison took over and led one final scoring drive, culminating with a 50-yard touchdown pass to Drake.

Offensively, the Panthers were held under 300 total yards at home for the first time since 2013 when they hosted Jefferson, the defending state

This week Union County travels to the Brickyard to face an improving North Hall Trojans squad that's won two-ofthree after starting 0-4.

With North Hall already owning wins over Fannin (13-0) and Lumpkin (55-14), a win over the Panthers would all but clinch a playoff spot for the Trojans, while eliminating Union County from postseason

"I think we match up

better with (North Hall) sizewise, but they're a well-coached football team," Allison said. "Offensively they are a running team that can still hurt you throwing the ball. On the other side, they're a solid 4-2 defense and their kids play very hard. I expect it to be like last year and go down to the wire. Hopefully we can move the ball and come out of there with a win."


Last year Union won 35-32 thanks to touchdown receptions of 73 and 64 yards from Sean Dobbins, who later picked off a Trojan pass attempt at the Panthers 28-yard line with 18 seconds left to secure the victory.

Union County has won all four of the previous meetings with North Hall.


