UGH Sports Medicine program helping local athletes on the road to recovery By Todd Forrest

Injuries can be extremely stressful situations for studentathlete and their parents, but that's when the specialists at Union General Orthopedics and Sports Medicine step up to the

And according to Dr. Jacob Stirton and his team, healing and recovery should be the only thing on everyone's mind during that demanding stage.

"This community really needed a sports medicine program," UGOSM Medical Director and Co-founder Dr. Stirton said. "It can take two hours to get to Atlanta, Athens or even Gainesville. That's a big trip, especially for someone who is injured. That's hard on parents, that's hard on the kids, that's hard on everyone."

That's why Dr. Stirton's office provides walk-in times of 7:30-8 a.m. and 3-4 p.m. everyday, allowing parents and student athletes the ability to visit a doctor without missing school, work or even needing an appointment.

When high school athletes get injured, you want to be seen right away," Dr. Stirton said. "If you call your primary care doc and he's booked up for two or three weeks, there goes half your season. We want to see everyone the day or the day after



get the imaging, the prognosis, the diagnosis and we either have you back on the field or have a plan for when you can get back. That is our goal and the athletes love it, the parents love it and the coaches love it.

"We tailor our program for ease of access for the patient and the parents. It's the parents that are getting the kids to their appointments and taking them back to school, so we need to make it as easy as possible, with multiple

(walk-in) times everyday.

Since arriving in Blairsville approximately 6 weeks ago, Dr. Stirton and his staff have tended to more than 100 athletes from the local area.

The Union General Sports Medicine program covers student-athletes at Union County, Towns County, Mountain Area Christian and Young Harris College. Additionally, they don't just cover student athletes, they see active individuals of all ages and skill levels -- from the weekend ners to the adult league basketball or softball player.

"My goals are to be a general orthopedic surgeon and take care of the entire community, from pediatrics to geriatrics, but with a special focus on the youth

Dr. Stirton is currently the team physician at both Union County High School and Young Harris College. Covering Towns County High School is Dr. Jonathan Lawrence, who is also

"No one thought we would be this successful this quickly, but that just goes to show that there is a huge need here," Dr. Stirton said. "I cover Union County and Young Harris and our sports medicine program covers Towns County. We don't officially cover Fannin, Murphy or Hayesville but we see athletes from there all of the time."

While the need for the sports medicine program was

what helped lure Dr. Stirton to Blairsville, it was the scenery of the Blue Ridge Mountains that put North Georgia on his radar.

"I've been all over the country with my wife and this is the most beautiful part of the country, in my mind," he said. This area is absolutely beautiful. I'm an active person too. I like sports, I like the outdoors and this is the perfect place for that.

That was what drew me to the area, but I after I visited for the first time, the people were very welcoming. Everyone was just phenomenal.
