Q: Is there anything else that we need to do to promote new industry in Union County?

A: Our focus has always been on attracting industry and manufacturing. It has always been difficult to attract manufacturing to our county even though we have so many things going for us. The negatives are: no railroad, no interstate, no natural gas, and no 4-lane connecting highways to anywhere other than Atlanta. However, we do have a good divided highway, Highway 515, we do have an Industrial Park with space available, an outstanding airport, and we have a great quality of life. Getting that word out is the biggest need.

Q: What are the main attractions we need to come up with to find industry inter-

ested in moving to our area? A: First, we need some

additional suitable space for business to expand into. If you know someone that has the means to finance a large industrial building (30,000 sq. ft. to 150,000 sq. ft.), let us know. We certainly can try to sell it or lease it to a prospective business.

Second, we need more trained workers. We are currently working with several organizations to make this happen, but it is going to take some time.

Third, we need to promote our area more aggressively so that we can attract the small to medium business entrepreneurs. While we have a great area to live in and work from, many still believe a business must be in or near a large metropolitan area.

substances, lack of interest in school participation and frequent alienation of others. Prevention programs that address substance use and high-risk sexual behaviors are proven to be more effective than programs that just focus on substance abuse or just focus on high risk sexual behaviors. These programs include individuals, peers, families, schools and communities.

Prevention strategies that are successful in reducing teen risk include multiple prevention activities in different areas of the teen's life. School based programs that focus on social skills and emotional awareness are fundamental to teaching students how to manage peer pressure. Peer led drug and alcohol resistance programs like Students Against Destructive Decisions, offers a safe social circle that practices low risk behaviors. Parenting programs that offer support and skills for dealing with difficult teen behaviors and programs that encourage parental engagement is another invaluable tool in reducing engagement in substance use and high-risk sexual behavior. Finally, family support programs that address the needs of each family member. .When students have a supportive school environment and their parents are actively engaged in their lives, they are less likely to engage in high risk behaviors.

Herbicides are usually the most effective way of controlling perennial invasive plants. Even with herbicides, it will take a couple of seasons to get full control. For perennials, you should apply herbicides in the fall. During the fall perennials are moving as many carbohydrates and energy down into their roots as possible. Therefore, if you apply a systemic herbicide the plant will also move the herbicide down into the roots, making the herbicide more effective. As always, whenever you use an herbicide read and follow the label.
