going West on Highway 515 from Blairsville does not have a red light and the majority of accidents have occurred at this location.

Vehicles leaving Wal-Mart and turning left have to cross over two lanes of moving traffic, then cross center turning lanes, and finally pull into one of the two lanes heading East toward Blairsville.

This is a lot of traffic to try and cross over safely with other vehicles trying to turn in different directions. This intersection will be completely changed with a curb or barrier preventing a vehicle from crossing in the above-men-

tioned way. It is called an "R Cut" and when leaving Walmart, vehicles will only be able to turn right toward the red light. They will not be able to go straight and cross over the median. However, if you are coming from Blairsville, you will still be able to turn left onto the new

road to the Blairsville Airport. If you are coming from Blue Ridge, this R Cut will still allow you to turn left into Walmart from that direction.

Q. If it is so simple to close off cross over traffic, why has this not been done before now?

A. Because it requires some other corresponding works to be done as well.

First, the red-light intersection will have to be completely redone including some grading and new paving because currently there is not enough turning radius for a tractor trailer truck to make a U-turn.

Second, adding new arrows must change the red lights.

In addition, a new Uturn area must be made just before the Coosa River Bridge so that vehicles coming from Blue Ridge going to Walmart, can go just a little past Walmart and make a U-turn to reach the

right turn lane West bound. Q. Why can't we just close the dangerous intersection completely?

A. That is a good question and the problem is that if all traffic movements are moved to the red light, and since it is located right at the top of a hill with limited visibility looking West bound toward Blue Ridge, there is concern that this will only move all the traffic accidents to the red light and concentrate them there.

That is one reason all the traffic has not already been sent to the red-light intersection.

GDOT also, this week, erected a temporary construction flashing signboard to warn people to slow down for construction and have added a temporary turn arrow.

They know it is a problem and are working as fast as they can to make the needed changes

But in the meantime...

Bottom Line, if people continue to drive while being distracted, we are going to continue to have serious traffic accidents all over the county.

Put your phones up while going though congested areas. You cannot drive and talk and keep your concentra-

tion on the highway. We all MUST start driv-

ing more carefully. Just because you have

the right of way doesn't mean you should not be looking and slowing down when in congested areas. We want you to all arrive

home safely from any trip, but as our county grows, so does our traffic.

When Pick was 28 years old his nephew, Paul, was born on his birthday. Papa told me he was almost glowing with the news of his nephew. He was a proud uncle. He drove to Papa's house and parked his car on Jan. 30, 1938. He was beaming as he walked into the house, picked up his nephew and walked toward the door. Granny asked him where he was going. He said, "I'm going to show off my nephew to all the neighbors." Granny said, "Pick, it is spitting snow and cold as a blue blazes." She told me later, "Pick was disappointed, but he understood.'

Later the family moved to Chicago and Uncle Pick came for a visit. After the visit the whole family loaded up in Pick's car and made their way back to Alabama. In Alabama there were very few traffic lights and the few that were there were hung on cables above the intersections. But, in Chicago and other big towns the traffic lights were mounted on sign posts at the corners of intersections. Before Pick left Chicago he had run 15 red lights and by the time he made it to Paducah, Kentucky he had run through four more. The

driving in Chicago. He always complained about the driving habits of those Yankee drivers. Dad was about 13 at the time and Uncle Pick offered Dad his keys saying, "Paul, I believe you could do better than me." Dad told me that he wanted to

but Papa took the keys instead.

A few years later Dad and his family moved back to Alabama whereupon Papa and his brother opened up a car dealership in Russellville. One of Uncle Pick's first customers was my Dad, Paul Cummings. He bought a 1951 sky blue Ford. Dad still remembers that car to this day. Meanwhile Uncle Pick became very popular with the citizens of Franklin County and was elected first to the city council of Russellville and later to the post of Probate Judge where he served with distinction for a number of years.

When my son, Will, came along we named him William Paul. He had the same initials, W. P., as Uncle Pick. When I told my great Uncle about this it was as if that same light came on again. He almost glowed at the thought of another Cummings generation that would remember Walker Pickens Cummings.

tect root systems as well.

Preserving heat is another way to protect plants. Draping a large blanket or cloth over young or sensitive plants can protect them from frost crystals forming and hold in heat absorbed by the soil. Leave the cloth loose and let it hang all the way down to the ground. Do not tie the cloth to the trunk of the tree or shrub, as this cuts the foliage off from the heat being released by the ground. Remove the cloth in the morning

to prevent too much heat from building up, causing the plant to exit dormancy.

Though sensitive greenery does need to be protected during severe temperatures, it is important not to overprotect on milder nights. Exposure to some cold temperatures can actually aid in cold-hardening plants. For more information on how to protect your plants against frost or what varieties may be susceptible, contact your extension office.

A quick search online told us that the plant originated in Africa, was brought to this country by the British and is an important food crop in Africa, Central America and South Asia.

In addition to the syrup, it is used as animal fodder, in the production of alcoholic beverages and biofuels.

It is a nutritious and increasingly popular edible grain in this country and is the 5th most important cereal crop grown in the world.

The grain is often found in commercial bird food and can be popped like popcorn. There is additional infor-
