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Wildfire contained; caution urged during drought

U.S. Forest Service officials discovered a wildfire last Wednesday afternoon that is visible from the Brasstown Bald Visitor Center, covering about 3 acres some 4,000 feet up on Chimneytop Mountain near the Arkaquah Trail in Union County.

The Arkaquah Trail has been temporarily closed due to its proximity to the fire, the cause of which is still under investigation.

USFS firefighters fought the fire all that Wednesday, Oct. 26, and work continued the next day to establish a control line around the fire.

Since then, 95 percent of the fire has been contained by a control line. The remaining

5 percent of the 3 acres is in a rocky area where firefighters have been unable to establish a control line, though they don't expect the fire to be a problem there because there's not much to burn in that particular area, according to Judy Toppins, public affairs officer with the U.S. Forest Service out of Gainesville.

"Basically, there's a line all the way around the fire that we would not expect the fire to go past," said Toppins. "That line could be a natural break that the fire wouldn't normally pass, like a stream, for instance. Or it's a line that we've created by removing all the fuels - that can be just raking the fuels out of the way, even."

Added Toppins: "What they're doing now is called

mop-up mode, and it's where they're just making sure that that line is staying clear. And if there are any fires at all, they're getting those out, but otherwise it's pretty much just making sure that they're maintaining that perimeter and letting that fire burn out within that 3 acres."

As far as a timeline goes, the fire could take days or weeks to fully burn out, due mostly to the steep terrain and amount of woody debris in the area, and should be highly visible in Union, Towns and surrounding counties.

"It's not an area that we have done prescribed fire in the past, where we would have removed a lot of the fuel loads, because it's in a congressionally designated Wilderness Area - it

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Serial burglars hit another local store

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Investigators with the County Sheriff's Office believe that the early Sunday morning burglary of the Food Heaven convenience store is connected to a series of burglaries across much of North Georgia.

The Oct. 30 burglary, according to UCSO Sgt. Lamar Dyer, was likely perpetrated by the same individuals as those who committed the Aug. 31 burglary of the Marathon Station up Murphy Highway near the Georgia/North Carolina state line.

Moore talks water, laments lack of rainfall

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The Hiwassee River Watershed hosted its Sixth Annual State of the Water presentation at the Union County Community Center on Tuesday, Oct. 25.

In the meeting, HRWC Executive Director Callie Moore addressed the state of the rivers and lakes within the Upper Hiwassee River Basin, sharing data concerning the water properties that had been accumulated over the previous year.

While the Tennessee Valley Authority has not yet released new data for the four major lakes within the basin, Moore did identify areas of concern for certain streams running through the basin that could cause problems for the
