Panthers demolish Fannin; playoffs on the line this Friday

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Blue Ridge - Union County scored early and often while leaving their mark on the record books during a 63-39 victory at Fannin County that wasn't as close as the final score indicated.

Not only did the Panthers set the team record for points in a single game with 63, it is believed they also broke the record for points in a half with 49. "Offensively, I can't say

enough about what a great job all of those guys did," Union County Head Coach Brian Allison said. "From receiver to center to quarterback to running back it was a really good night. Meanwhile, the senior class

becomes the winningest class in program history with 31 victories during their four-year career, that has at least one game remaining. The win at Fannin moves

Union County one step closer to clinching the No. 3 spot in Region 7-AAA as they host Lumpkin County on Friday for Senior Night. However, a loss on Friday could potentially knock the Panthers out of the playoffs for the first time in A few different playoff

scenarios could play out depending on the outcome of the Lumpkin County at Union County game, this Friday. If the Panthers win, it's simple, Union is third, North Hall is fourth (via their win over Lumpkin), and Lumpkin misses

A Union loss results in a three-way tie for third, and one would almost need a degree in calculus to decipher the tiebreaker.

Since all three teams finished with one win and one loss against the other two teams, the head-to-head matchups go out the window. That leaves what is essentially the margin of victory vs the other two teams as the determining factor.

Simply put, Lumpkin would need to defeat Union by six-ormore points to end the Panthers' season and move North Hall into third and Lumpkin to fourth.

If Union falls by five-orfewer points, the Panthers claim the fourth seed and North Hall

As for the top half of the region, the only unbeaten squads in 7-AAA will square off in Dawsonville this Friday night when Greater Atlanta Christian and Dawson County settle the Region Championship on the field.

The Tigers are riding high following a 54-8 romp of arch-rival Lumpkin County that saw Dawson open the game with 40 unanswered points. Down in Norcross, the Spartans are coming off a bye week with two weeks to prepare for Dawson County.

As the No. 1 and No. 2 spots in Region 7-AAA are determined in Dawson County, the No. 3 and No. 4 seeds will be settled in Blairsville when the Panthers host Lumpkin County on Senior Night.

Union County put itself in the driver's seat for third place with its 63-39 rout over rival Fannin last week in Blue Ridge.


The Panthers stormed out to a 49-9 halftime advantage over an emotionally-charged Rebels' squad that was hosting Senior Night.

Quarterback Cole Wright and running back Bo Lynch continued to put up huge numbers, combining for all nine Union touchdowns and 583 total yards. Lynch, who ran for three scores, also took his place among the elite running backs in the history of the program with 15 rushing touchdowns on the season, and 26 for his career – one short of tying Gabe Mantovani and Matthew West for the most touchdowns by a Panther running back since 1990. corner of page). However, in the early-going, the Union offense caught a break in the form of a roughing-the-kicker penalty that led to their first score of the game. Later the defense used three consecutive, second quarter interceptions to put Fannin County away before halftime.

Following a clipping penalty on the Panthers' first play of the game, Cole Wright and company were unable to overcome a 1 st-and-25, resulting in a punting situation. Things appeared to turn

fingertips of junior punter R.J. Banton, who was able to scoop up the loose football but the kick went off the side of his foot and outof-bounds, just shy of the Union 30-yard line. Luckily two Rebel defend-

ers plowed into Banton after the kick, resulting in a 15-yard personal foul and an automatic first With new-life breathed into

the offense, Lynch took a 2ndand-2 handoff down the visitors' sideline, shedding a tackler at the 15, then dragging another defensive back across the goal line for a 54-yard touchdown run. "We made some mistakes

early on with the bad snap and the penalty, and had the mistakes continued, we would have been in for a long night," Coach Allison said. "We were able to settle in, get things going, and I thought we played pretty good."

Fannin County would answer with a 10-play, 72-yard scoring drive that was capped off by a 19-yard touchdown pass from senior Brad Davis to fellow senior Cooper Earls, who was returning from a knee injury that cost him three games. The two-point conversion pass attempt fell incomplete and the Panthers held a 7-6 advantage with 5:01 left in the first quarter. It would be all Union Coun-

ty for the remainder of the half.

Taking over at their own 33, Wright found Logan Dyer over the middle for 19 yards before Wright rey made a diving interception at moved the chains again with a the 15-yard line to keep Fannin 14-yard bootleg, two plays later. off the board and in a 35-9 hole. Facing a 4th-and-2, later in the series, Wright kept the drive alive with a 15-yard keeper that set up a 4-yard scoring run from Lynch - his second of the game.

Union scored again after the defense forced a three-and-out and the offense set up shop at the Rebels' 34-yard line following a punt and a personal foul against

A loss on first down and a second down incompletion forced the Panthers into 3rd-and-12 but Wright hit Lynch on a wheel-route, down the sideline for a pickup of 34. Three plays later from inside the five, Wright found a seam up-the-middle and gave his team a 21-6 lead.

In last week's North Georgia News, Coach Allison discussed the role that turnovers would have on the outcome, and while holding a 15-point lead, the Union defense quickly turned this rivalry game into a blowout with three straight

"I feel like defensively we played pretty good in the first half, as good as we've played in a long time, and against a really good offense," Coach Allison said.

The first came on the ensuing possession with the Rebels driving into Panther territory, attempting to make it a one-score game, junior Cole Dockrey jumped in-front a Fannin receiver inside the 30-yard line and returned the interception back to the Rebels'

Unfortunately, the Panthers were hit with a holding penalty, followed by a delay of game, pushing them back onto their own side of midfield. With a 1st-and-27, Wright connected with Kanon Hemphill on a middle-screen that the sophomore receiver turned into

a 14-yard gain.

On the very next play, Wright took a quarterback draw up the middle for a 44-yard scoring run to stretch the lead to 28-6.

Fannin responded by driving all the way down to the Union 13, but the Panthers' defense stiffened a forced three incompletions to hold them to a 30-yard

With it's advantage trimmed to 28-9, Lynch went back to work and picked up 34 yards on the first play of the ensuing drive. A third down pass to Hemphill was good for 20 and a fresh set of downs at the 22. From there Lynch took the read-option give from Wright and raced across the goal line for his third touchdown of the night.

Once again the Rebels offense was on the move until Dock-The pick was brought on by the pressure of defensive lineman of Daniel Hernandez who was in the face of Davis, forcing the Rebels' QB to heave a pass into the middle

With just over three minutes left in the half and needing 85 yards for a score, Union wasn't about to settle for just one more touchdown.

A scramble by Wright moved the chains before a roughing-the-passer flag gave the Panthers another first down. An 11yard hookup from Wright to Austin Pattee moved Union into Fannin territory, then Wright connected with Hemphill on a 10-yard digroute that Hemphill turned into a 45-vard touchdown when he outran the Rebels secondary to the

With 1:14 to play in the half, the Panthers were also running away on the scoreboard at 42-9.

On the second play of Fannin's ensuing possession, senior linebacker Luke Winkler snagged a bullet pass from Davis that handed the ball back to the offense with 49 seconds to work with and 32 yards from pay dirt.

Wright went to Erik Straver on a pair of screen passes to the boundary, allowing the junior receiver to get out-of-bounds and stop the clock following gains of nine and five yards, respectively.

Wright then used his legs for a gain of 12, setting up the Panthers with a 1st-and-goal from the six. Lynch took a sweep around the left end but was forced out just shy of the pylon. With a second down from the one, Wright rolled right and hit Pattee in the endzone, who had to climb the ladder to reel in the high pass with his fingertips, reminiscent of "The Catch" by the 49ers' Dwight Clark in the 1982 NFC Championship Game.

"Those three turnovers and the roughing penalty on the punt were really the difference in the game. That was the turning point," Coach Allison said. "But I think the penalty made a huge difference."

The grab by Pattee and the point after by Brian Smith put the game out of reach before the teams even entered the locker rooms at halftime. With 15 seconds left in the second, Union was in complete control at 49-9.

"All week long we talked about jumping on them early,

getting a lead, then being able to dictate what they would be able to do, but I never expected a 40-point lead," Coach Allison said. The Rebels received the

opening kick of the second half and drove to the Panthers' 3-yard line where the defense forced a turnover-on-downs and the offense took over in the shadow of its own On the second play of the

series, Lynch got the handoff and slipped an arm tackle at the line of scrimmage and broke loose between the hash marks. At midfield he bounced outside and raced down the home sideline for one of the longest runs in school history – 95 yards to be exact.

However, a questionable block in the back call at midfield negated the run when a Fannin defender tripped over his own feet while turning his back on a Union blocker – bringing out the flag.

Regardless, the Panthers still had the ball at the 41 and Dyer reeled in a pass from Wright for pick up of 21. A pair of runs by Dockrey advanced Union to the 20-yard line where Hemphill ran a go-route on second down and raced under the pass in the back of the endzone for his second touchdown pass of the game.

Hemphill finished the game with five grabs for 105 yards and two scores - all career highs.

Fannin trimmed the Panthers' lead to 56-17 when Earls took an end-around 25-yards and the two-point attempt was successful. The Rebels then perfectly executed an onside kick and Davis and Earls connected deep-ball down the sideline for a 47-yard scoring strike.

With three quarters in the books, Union remained in complete control at 56-23.

Once again, Fannin recovered an onside kick and found the endzone with 8:13 to play when Davis punched it in from a yard out. The two-point conversion was good to bring the score to 56-31.

With the starters back in the game, Wright put an exclamation point on the victory with a 63-yard touchdown run to put this Panthers' team in the record books with the top-two highest scoring games in the program's history.

'If he (Fannin coach Jim Pavao) hadn't started onside kicking, I would have been done (with the starters) at 56 (points)," Coach Allison added. The 63-point performance

topped the 61-point output from the Hayesville game back on Sept. 2. The Rebels added a late

touchdown and two-point conversion to make the score a bit more respectable at 63-39. Wright finished with 240 passing yards, 172 rushing yards

and six total touchdowns. His partner in crime, Lynch totaled 220 vards of offense, with 171 and three scores coming on the ground. *Looking ahead: The Indians' Wishbone option attack is

second to North Hall in Region 7-AAA at 345 rushing yards-pergame. Senior fullback Zach Matthews, a converted quarterback, leads the team with 1,210 yards and 12 scores.

However, Lumpkin is coming off season-lows in total offense (143 yards), rushing yards (131).

and yards-per-carry (2.9) at Dawson County. Matthews was limited to 58 yards and no scores - his second lowest total of the year. As for Matthews' replace-

ment at quarterback, first-year starter Chandler Woodham averages 66 YPG on the ground but isn't much of a threat to throw the ball. The junior signal caller has only completed 15-of-49 passes on the year. Matthews' backfield partner

is junior Cole White (not to be confused with Union's QB), who is churning out 84 YPG on the ground along with nine scores. "They do a great job coach-

ing those kids (at Lumpkin), they play very hard, and they're extremely disciplined," Coach Allison said.

Defensively, senior Connor Heriot and junior Josh Chastain are the sack leaders with four each, while senior Micah Adams has picked off two passes.

Junior kicker Wesley Wells is also a difference maker with a 48-yard field goal to his name this season. Overall, Wells has connected on 7-of-9 field goal attempts, 19-of-21 extra points, and 21-of-46 kickoffs have reached the endzone for a touchback.

Last week, Lumpkin yielded 249 rushing yards to Dawson County. In their last four region contests, the Indians have surrendered 233 YPG on the ground. Over the last two weeks combined, they have given up more than 1,000 yards of total offense.

On the other side, the Panthers are rushing at a clip of 283 YPG over their last two games and sit atop the region in total offense

at 424 YPG. "I've watched them throughout the course of the year and it seems like they get betterand-better every week so I expect quite the challenge for our offense," Coach Allison said. "We need to execute, don't turn the ball over, and just do the things that we know how to do.'
