Panthers survive second half scare at Lumpkin to finish 6-4

Dahlonega - The Union County Panthers closed the season with a 31-24 victory at Lumpkin County to improve to 6-4 on the year despite needing late-game heroics from seniors Cole Wright and Bryan Nelson after a 24-10 third quarter advantage slipped away late in

the game.
"It's a funny thing," Union County Head Coach Brian Allison said. "You go through the whole season and never play a close ball game until the very last week. We either won by 20-plus or lost by 20-plus."

Leading 21-10 coming out of halftime, the Union County defense forced a threeand-out and the offense responded with a 39-yard Brian Smith field goal to extend the advantage to 24-10 with 6:25 to play in the third. The Panthers settled for three after a 15-yard scoring run by senior Cole Dockrey was called back on a holding penalty, bringing up a 2nd-and-18 that proved too much to overcome.

The Indians pulled within a touchdown with an 8-play, 80-yard scoring drive, capped off by a 36-yard run late in the third. On the fourth play of the ensuing Union County series, the Panthers coughed up the football near midfield after Wright and Austin Pattee hooked up for 26 yards on 2ndand-7 from the 23.

"That was a huge momentum swing when we failed to put them away in the third quarter," Allison said. "Getting the touchdown called back would have made it 28-10, then fumbling the football when we were up 24-17 was another missed opportunity."

Starting from its own 46, Lumpkin went nowhere as the Panther defense, playing without three-year starter Matthew Beise on the line, gave the ball back to the offense with a critical stop on 4th-and-2

When it was all said-and-done, the Indians possessed the ball for nearly 8-and-a-half minutes of game time, taking over with 2:29 left in the first and punching it in the endzone with 6:00 to play in the second quarter. The drive spanned 71 yards on 16 plays with two third down and one fourth down conversion to pull within four at 14-10.

On the ensuing drive the Panthers went nowhere and had to kick it back to Lumpkin following a three-and-out that resulted in a loss of 3 yards. A booming 56-yard punt

by Banton pushed the Indians back to their own 32 where Union recovered a fumble at its own 49, five plays later. A pass interference penalty on the first play moved the Panthers down to the 36 followed by a 17-yard give to Dockrey and an 8-yard keeper from Wright.

Two straight handoffs to Dockrey from the 11 had Union County back in the endzone and back up by 11 at 21-10 with 1:22 left in the half.

"I know they wanted more out of this season, but due to various adverse situations, things didn't happen the way we wanted them to happen."


