Paris... continued from Page 4A U.S. Forest Service, there are certain steps that must be completed. An environmental study is next on the list. Recently, a live fire sound study was completed, and preliminary results seemed positive, but it is not finalized yet.

Q. Where is the proposed shooting range to be located?

A. The proposed site is located along Highway 180 E about 5 miles from the intersection of the Gainesville Highway (Hwy 19/129 S). Q. What type and cali-

ber of weapons will be allowed at the shooting range? A. That is yet to be de-

termined. Pistols and rifles will be allowed but will not include

any extra high caliber weapons. Plus, we have to remember that all studies must be successfully completed before this site can be approved by the USFS.

Q. Who will be in con-

trol of the gun range? A. The permit will be in the name of Union County Government, and we will be primarily responsible. However, the Union County Gun Club will be in charge of the gun range. Again, all details will not be complete until final approval of the property, and then all the remaining details will be worked out. tected for some time. As the fire front passes, these small embers may ignite incipient fires that spread to the home and then from home to home in a neighborhood.

The Gatlinburg fires last fall were caused by ember showers from the mountains above that rained down on the unprepared city and surrounding areas. These ember showers were caused by the extreme winds and dry conditions that created the perfect storm that consumed a large portion of the city that destroyed more than 2,200 homes and businesses and killed 14 people.

I talked to a firefighter from South Dakota who was deployed to Gatlinburg during the fires, and she said that all the homes in the neighborhood they were assigned to protect were threatened by fire and they had to choose to try to save only those that were savable and safe for the crew. The savable ones were the homes where the owners had taken preventative measures to remove fuel on and around the structures or were built with non-combustible materials.

most important The thing we learned in Firefighter 101 is that safety for the firefighters comes first, and in Gatlinburg, the crews could not put themselves in jeopardy to try to save a home that was a hazard to them or their equipment. Fire engines cost much more than most houses, and firefighters' lives are priceless.

I saw a video recently about a wildfire that swept through a neighborhood where the fire crews were chasing the fire down the street. They had passed by several houses that seemed to be intact and not on fire. When they returned in a couple of hours, these homes were on the ground. They were burned by embers that were nestled in fuel on the roof and ignited once winds

fanned the spark. for Business and Home Safety (IBHS) conducted a series of beneficial tests in spring 2011 at their research center in Richburg, South Carolina, to explore the effects of ember intrusion on differing home constructions. The tests illustrate both the threats and preparedness steps residents can take to prevent ember-caused

Fire departments should consider utilizing this information in their presentations with residents to help explain the ember threat. You can check the IBHS website to see their videos. They are real eye-openers!

Recently, CBS 60 Minutes aired a piece on Wildland Urban Interface and the dangers that are ever-present to residents living there. drug-free workplace program. Supervisor oversight and employee accountability within the workplace are essential to ensure a safe, productive work environment. This includes drug-free workplace programs that require pre-employment and random testing (in states where random testing

is a "best practice" that ensures

employees are adhering to the

requirements of the company's

Lowering hiring standards in reaction to applicant shortages caused by a tight labor market is never a good idea. Changing hiring practices that lead to screening out fewer candidates (such as doing away with pre-employment drug testing, or allowing employees who test positive for so-called "softer drugs" to be hired) will increase the risk that the wrong candidates will be allowed in. These bad hires can cost the company substantial amounts of money.

Substance abusers and addicts often engage in counterproductive behaviors, such as theft and other forms of crime, in the workplace. Their drug abuse can lead to the inability to perform certain key job tasks and place them at risk of damaging company property or injuring themselves, customers, clients and coworkers.

If a company must adjust its hiring practices due to staffing problems in a tight
