Lady Panthers rally past Gilmer 44-39 in season opener

A pair of new faces take the helm of an old rivalry when Union visits Towns on Tuesday

In a game of runs, the Union County Lady Panthers overcame a 6-point fourth quarter deficit with a 12-1 outburst over the final 4:50 to knock off Gilmer 44-39 last Friday

After leading by as many as 10 in the first half and eight at the break, the Class AAAA Lady Bobcats stormed ahead 24-23 with a 9-0 run out of the locker room.

'We found ourselves down so I called a timeout and told them, 'now we're in a ball game," Union County first-year head coach Corey Garrett said. "I was excited. Not because we lost the lead but because we were able to comeback and stop the bleeding to put ourselves in a position to win. I was superproud of that.'

Trailing 33-29 after three, Union was down six at the fiveminute mark when sophomore Andelin Hill scored on a putback then followed that up with two free throws to make it a 38-36 game with 3:54 to play.

Two missed Lady Bobcat free throws led to an Aubree Pack trey on the other end to give her team its first lead since the 4:50 mark of the third. With just over a minute remaining, Gilmer hit 1-of-2 at the line to even the score but Union went inside to sophomore Kait McCarter, who put her team on top 41-39 with 49 seconds left. Moments later, McCarter rebounded a Lady Bobcat miss and drew a foul to earn a trip to the line with 31 seconds remaining. After splitting a pair, Gilmer trailed by three but were unable to connect from long distance on consecutive possessions – the second resulting in an intentional foul on Bailey Daniel, who went 1-of-2 to put the game away with 4.8 seconds left

held a 3-0 advantage but the Lady Panthers pulled ahead 7-5 after one. Tied at 7-7 in the second, Union responded with a 12-2 run to open up a 19-9 lead before taking a 23-15 advantage into halftime.

'I was proud of our man defense," Garrett said. "We were really anticipating, we were stopping cuts, we were active on screens, both off-theball and on-ball screens. We just couldn't finish some of those stops with rebounds and that really hurt us a lot, which is something we're going to have to work on.

Leading 23-17, the Lady Bobcats drew a shooting foul that resulted in a technical foul on Union. After hitting all four free throws to pull within two at the 5:48 mark, Gilmer drew even at 23-23 with 4:50 to play. A 1-for-2 visit to the charity stripe 27 seconds later put the since it was 3-0.

"I actually coached against him when I was with the middle school boys and he was coaching the Rabun middle school boys," Garrett said. "He has ties to (Rabun head girls coach Dee Dee Dillard) and he's trying to play a lot like Rabun. They like to press, like Rabun; they used full-court pressure nearly the whole game, like Rabun and they played man-toman defense, like Rabun."

Last Saturday the Lady Indians traveled to Rabun County to face off with the Lady Cats, and while they may use identical schemes, the similarities end there.

The Lady Cats, fresh off a State Runner-Up finish, didn't miss a beat and easily handled Towns County 75-29.

Although, the Lady In-

dians were within striking distance for much of the first half, trailing 12-6 after one, 20-11 at the 6:02 mark of the second, and 24-14 less than 90 seconds later. However, in typical Rabun fashion, the Lady Cats' defense sparked a 12-4 spurt to take control at the break, 36-18.

Panthers overcome early struggles, pull away from Gilmer 48-34

The Panthers overcame an ice-cold first half shooting performance with a stifling second half defensive effort to race past Gilmer 48-34.

Trailing by as many as 15 in the first half and 13 at the break, Union County outscored the Bobcats 33-6 in the second half – including an 11-0 fourth quarter – after low-scoring first half that resulted in a 28-15 halftime deficit.

The Panthers caught a break late in the first quarter when Gilmer's Tyler Sims went down with an apparent lowerextremity injury after scoring eight of his team's first 11 points on 2-of-2 shooting from beyond the arc. Union was able to close the first with a 5-1 spurt for a respectable 16-9 score but just two second quarter field goals from the Panthers allowed Gilmer to extend its lead to 13 at the break.

'Sometimes you just have to chalk it up to not being able to make a shot," Head Coach Casey Jones said in regards to the first half struggles. "Our energy on defense, oftentimes is related to us making buckets. I don't know what it is, but it seems like when we pick up our energy we start making buckets. If you look back at the first half, our energy on defense wasn't where it needed to be.'

Trailing 32-21, a Patrick Baggett trey sparked an 11-0 run to tie it up at 32-32. Following the Baggett three, sophomore Pierson Allison converted the and-one to pull within five. A Crawford Colwell bucket then an Allison trey knotted the score at the 2:50 mark of the third.

A Gilmer basket gave them a brief 34-32 lead but an Allison free throw and an RJ Banton putback handed Union its first lead of the game with 22 seconds left in the period. On the ensuing Panther possession, Cole Davis drove baseline to beat the buzzer, and two Bobcat defenders, spotting Union a 37-34 lead after three quarters.

"I told the guys at halftime, 'surely we can't have

another half of shooting like we just did, so be patient and try to get to the rim more," Jones said. "We were probably relying to heavily on the outside shot so we started working it inside. Of course we got a couple of steals that led to layups and that always

helps get you going." The Panthers' smothering defense continued into the final frame as two Allison free throws and a Banton layup opened up a 41-34 advantage just 90 seconds into the fourth. Sophomore Sawyer Drake added another basket for a 43-34 advantage that held until inside of two minutes when Jones emptied the bench.

Colton Day and Jared Nelson added a late bucket while Timothy Murphy hit 1-for-2 from the foul line.

Allison scored nine of his game-high 10 points in the second half while seniors Crawford Colwell and Baggett scored eight and seven, respectively.


Banton added 6 points and fellow senior Candler Colwell scored four. Drake, Davis, and Britt Waller added 2 points each; Day, Nelson, and Coleson Daniel also added two apiece while Murphy finished with one.

"Being down 13 at halftime, we've already had that game where we faced adversity and it's always good to look back on that whenever you get down in the future."

Behind three early treys from Baggett, the Panthers opened up a 13-1 lead at the midway point of the first. The Yellow Jackets would storm back, however, behind senior standout and Western Carolina commit Josh Cottrell to make it a one possession game at 15-12

Baggett connected three more times from downtown during the second quarter to go with a trey from Drake. Banton and Crawford Colwell added a bucket each in the period to send Union into the break with a 31-24 lead.

Allison got in on the 3-point barrage with a pair of treys while Baggett continued to scorch the Jackets into the

third quarter. Union opened up a 48-35

advantage entering the fourth and appeared to be in control at

50-36 with 6:00 remaining. Hayesville refused to go away and cut the Union lead to 50-41 at the 5-minute mark and 50-43 with 4:30 to play. Clinging to a 52-43 lead, another Baggett trey gave the Panthers some breathing room but the Yellow Jackets answered with a three of their own to trim the Union lead back to single digits at the 3:13 mark.

With two minutes to play, the Panthers still led by nine but five unanswered from Hayesville made it a contest at 57-53 with 38 seconds left, but that's as close as the Jackets would get as Union held on 59-53.

Baggett's 27 led all scorers while Allison added 10 and Drake chipped in nine. The Panthers got seven from Crawford Colwell and two each from Da-

vis, Banton, and Sawyer Brey. "I thought some of the
