Panthers hang on at Gilmer; host Towns County on Tuesday

Baenninger scores 12 of his 17 in second half as Union rallies late after surrendering big lead

Ellijay - The Union County Panthers were victorious in their season opener in what turned out to be a nail-biter after they appeared to on their way to a blowout victory over the Class AAAA Gilmer Bobcats.

With the addition of several key players from the gridiron earlier in the week, the Panthers sprinted out to an 18-5 lead after one and stretched their advantage to 23-8 with 3:00 to play in the However, Gilmer would

continue to chip away until late in the third quarter when they sent Union County reeling with a 13-0 run that turned a 36-26 Panther lead into a 39-36 Bobcat advantage with 6:50 to play. Gilmer would eventu-

points over the first 22 minutes, the Bobcats nearly matched that output with 24 points during a span that lasted just 8-minutes during the third and fourth Despite trailing by double-

digits for the majority of the game, Gilmer refused to go away. They trimmed a 15-point deficit to 10 at the half, then cut that lead to six after the third frame.

With 2:27 left in the third, senior Lawson Baenninger, who led all scorers with 17, connected from downtown to give Union a 36-26 advantage before they fell into a scoring slump that saw the Panthers go more than four-and-a-half minutes without a field goal.

In the meantime, Gilmer couldn't miss. The Bobcats connected on

three consecutive treys to open the fourth quarter after hitting their final two shots of the third.

The barrage was slowed momentarily when Baenninger hit 1-of-2 at the line to bring the Panthers back within two at 39-37. But Gilmer continued their onslaught with a 2-point jump shot that made it a 41-37 game with 5:56 remaining.

On the next two offensive possessions, Gilmer attacked the basket and were successful both times, including an acrobatic, off-balance attempt that banked its way through the net, handing the Bobcats their largest lead of the night at 47-42.

Cole Dockrey worked his way inside for two and seconds later, senior Parker McCombs came up with a steal and drew a foul on his lay-up attempt. Both his tries from the line were on the money and Union was within one.

The Panthers finally forced a Gilmer miss and Baenninger delivered a go-ahead trey from the wing with 2:27 remaining to put Union back on-top, 49-47.
