the North Georgia News had not learned any details of a potential search for Allison's replacement, though Allison did say that the chamber board would be taking resumes until Dec. 1.

Allison started her job at the chamber on March 16, 2016. She took over from Patrick Malone, who was serving as interim president of the chamber at the time.

The board chose Allison to replace Cindy Williams,

who served as the president and CEO of the chamber for nearly 10 years.

Williams departed for the Cartersville-Bartow County Chamber of Commerce in January of 2016, and the chamber board looked at more than 60 initial candidates to fill the position.

From there, the board chose to do 16 in-person interviews, followed by four in-depth interviews, the result of which was the hiring of

Allison to lead the chamber.

"I hope all of you had a wonderful Thanksgiving with family and friends," said Regina in a written statement. "I wanted to take this opportunity to say thank you

"I feel at this season in my life, devoting as much time to them as possible needs to be my top priority.

"I cannot thank you

enough for all your support, words of encouragement and help during my time with the Chamber. It has been very humbling.

"I would like to say a special thank you to the Chamber Board, Chamber Ambassadors and Staff for all that you do, day in and day out, for the Chamber and our community."

Regina Allison is the wife of Stephen Allison, who served multiple terms in the Georgia House of Representatives District 8 seat, before deciding not to run for re-election last year.

The Blairsville-Union County Chamber of Commerce is staffed by Tobie Chandler as tourism director, Sheila Freeman as information specialist, Chris Coleman as office administrator and Carrie Beary as event coordinator.

At the time of the 2015 search, Dr. Rayfield was one of 27 applicants for the position.

Dr. Rayfield came to Union County from Decatur County, Georgia, where he had been superintendent since 2010.

Now, the board must work to find a replacement for Dr. Rayfield before the start of the 2018-2019 school year.

Odom said in the November work session that her research had led her to contact the Georgia School Boards Association about its superintendent search service, as well as King-Cooper & Associates.

"Based on that information and on the cost, and Dr. Addis has done three successful searches for Union County, I invited Dr. Addis to come and speak to us, and explain what we're getting for our buck," said Odom.

In his presentation, Dr.

Addis told the board it had several options to choose from when considering how to proceed in naming a new superintendent.

He said that, as far as he was aware, the board could decide not to hold a search at all and name a finalist it wants to hire, wait out the 14 days of public comment, then hire the person named.

The board can also search to replace Dr. Rayfield on its own, which Dr. Addis advised could be a complicated process.

Or the board can hire someone with superintendent

search experience to assist with the search, a professional like Dr. Addis himself, to help board members navigate various pitfalls associated with conducting a superintendent search.

Following Dr. Addis' presentation in the work session, the school board voted in its subsequent regular meeting to table, or postpone, the superintendent search process until a later date.

There was not yet an active superintendent search at press time Monday.

"This was a difficult decision that was made with a great deal of thought and prayer," said Dr. Rayfield in a written statement on his retirement. "My family and I

have enjoyed a great 30-year career in education, with 15 of those years serving as a school superintendent. Our family plans to continue to make our home in Union County.

"Union County Schools is an excellent school system with great teachers and staff. There is no doubt in my mind that Union County Schools will continue to foster a culture of excellence in education.

"Our family is thankful for the opportunity to serve this community. We will do everything possible to support the school system through this leadership transition, and wish only the best for Union County Schools moving forward."

In 2017, a study of AllMusic's catalog indicated the Beach Boys as the sixth most frequently cited artist influence in its database. The core quintet of the three Wilsons, Love and Jardine were inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1988.

Reserved Seating for Friday's concert is \$55-plus handling, and tickets to the event are in short supply.

The Beach Boys began as a garage band managed by the Wilson brothers' father, Murry Wilson, with Brian Wilson's increasingly sophisticated songwriting and recording abilities dominating their creative direction.

Emerging at the head of the "California Sound," the band performed original material that reflected a Southern California youth culture of surfing, cars and romance.

A list of their many hits include "Good Vibrations," "Wouldn't It Be Nice," "I Get Around," "Kokomo," "Surfin' Safari," "Don't Worry Baby," "Surfin' U.S.A.," "California

Girls," "Help Me Rhonda," "Barbara Ann," and "Fun, Fun, Fun," just to name a few.
