weight and type and at year's retardants, they can usually ized receipt of the donations. The producer's "tax letter" will provide the weights and types of produce donated.

The Society of St. An-

drew is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, which means the gifts are likely tax deductible. Federal legislation protects the producer from any liability while the volunteers are on the farm gleaning the fields. Farmers are protected from all liability concerns through the Bill Emerson "Good Samaritan" Food Donation Act, passed by the US Congress in 1996. SoSA, as a nonprofit, ensures that the landowner and the recipients are 100% protected from liability. SoSA steps in at whatever point produce is declared waste and unmarketable and they work with the producer throughout the do-

nation process.

SoSA will handle: Produce still in the field or orchard after the harvesters have finished at end of season? at the U-Pick farm or Agritourism business? They will send and supervise volunteer gleaners to harvest the produce by hand. Produce graded out at the packing house? They can pick up produce by the bin, dump trailer, or tractor-trailer load, and haul it away, for distribution off-site. Produce rejected at warehouse, distribution center, or grocery store? They will work quickly to offload rejected produce and transport it to nearby agencies for distribution.

Produce on a truck involved in an accident? Unless it has been harmed by a fuel spill or by chemical fire

end, they will provide an item-recover and distribute this good tood to nungry tamilies. SoSA charges no fees, to those who donate food or to those who receive it. Their operating expenses are covered by donations from individuals, churches and civic organizations, and grants.

The Society of St. Andrew brings people together to harvest and share healthy food, reduce food waste, and build caring communities by offering nourishment to hun-

gry neighbors. Share Our Surplus is a great way to encourage healthier eating in the community, address the issues of food waste and hunger, focus on the abundance of food available to us, and support the work of the Society of St. Andrew. Sharp Memorial United Methodist Church in Young Harris has taken the lead in Towns and Union counties to get this food rescue and distribution program started and has hired an intern to lead and

much of the trail. We came

upon a place where stones were stacked upon each other by the Civilian Conservation Corps boys. These stones were used in the construction of the road bed we were following. Harold began telling me about his father, Little Ed Dyer.

Ed and one of his uncles used to have some hogs up around Low Gap which the two men kept fed. In the fall of each year they would gather the hogs and drive them to market in Gainesville. The men would drive the hogs across the road which Harold and I were walking to Tesnatee Gap, then south down the Logan Turnpike to Cleveland and on to Gainesville. But, Harold said the Logan Turnpike was special to him for another reason.

During World War I Little Ed Dyer went to fight along with many others in that ugly war. After the war he came home and was stationed at Old Fort Gordon. Upon getting out of the army he rode a bus to Gainesville where he caught a train to Cleveland. He spent the night with a Nix fellow in Cleveland, and the next morning he caught a logging train to Helen. He left the town of Helen on foot and began walk-

ing. Near the Tesnatee Gap on the Logan Turnpike, Little Ed hitched a ride with a man named Neel. The man was driving a nice car which was rarely seen in Union County during this time. Also in the car was the man's wife, his daughter and her Nanny. The man told Ed that he was about

to build a new road into Union County and was trying to determine which gap to bring the road through.

Later, Ed took a job with a crew building the new road, and it was built through Walasi-yi Gap. In honor of Mr. Neel, the name of the Gap was later changed to Neel's Gap.
