## Lady Panthers win two of three, suffer first loss at Fannin

The Union County Lady Panthers recorded a pair of home blowouts over Tallulah Falls and Towns County after moving into the 10th spot in last week's Class AA rankings, however, they would drop their first game of the season, 52-47 at Fannin County on Saturday, Dec. 7 to close out the week. Sitting at 5-1 on the

year, Union County will take Tuesday night off before entering Region 8-AA play with a pair of weekend showdowns with Elbert County and Monticello - both of whom played spoiler to the Lady Panthers' playoff hopes last season.

Union County plays host to Elbert County on Friday in the first meeting since the Blue Devils were victorious in a low-scoring, upset victory in Blairsville last January. On Saturday, the Lady Panthers will hit the road to face Monticello, who ended Union's season in the first round of the region tournament in February.


By the end of this week, Lady Panther fans could have a pretty clear picture of whether or not their team is ready to compete for a region title or if they're to remain a middle-of-the-pack squad in

Lady Panthers 52, Towns County 24 - Sophomore Ava Hunter matched the Lady Indians by herself with a game-high 24 points as Union County held Towns County without a field goal until the third quarter of its 28-point victory on Friday.

The Lady Panthers won their fifth straight behind a smothering defense that helped spark a 16-0 advantage after one quarter and 28-0 in the second before a Vanessa Floyd free throw put the Lady Indians on the board. Seven second-quarter

free throws from Floyd would account for all of the Towns offense in the first half as Union County held a comfortable 36-7 lead at the break.

Hunter did most of her damage in the first 16 minutes as she poured in 18 first half points. Freshman Ellie Cook

in the first two quarters and junior Kyla Locklear scored four of her six in the first half. Seniors Brooke Dockrey, and freshman Kaylee Helton rounded out the Union scorpoints apiece.

opens Friday when Union County hosts 2-1 Elbert County. The Blue Devils came on strong at the end of last season, defeating Union in Blairsville then upsetting the 2-seed Banks County in the region tournament to finish second in 8-AA.

Following a region title game loss to Rabun County, Elbert knocked off Callaway in the opening round of State before losing at Rockmart, 63-55 in the second round. Despite peaking at the right moment last season, Elbert must replace six of its topseven players. They are still led by returning point guard Maggie Campbell and already owns wins over rival Hart County (54-46) and a struggling Crawford County (66-15). Their lone defeat was a 63-46 loss to Madison County, who finished 25-3 last year en route to winning the Region 8-AAAA championship.

Union County will travel to Monticello on Saturday looking for revenge on the squad that eliminated them from last year's Region 8-AA tournament. The Canes are currently 1-4 with its win a 42-35 victory over winless Greene County. Their four losses have come by an average margin of 36.5 points. albeit against pretty solid competition who sport a combined record of 17-9.

Last year, Monticello finished with a 15-14 record and lost a 63-62 nailbiter at Region 5-AA Champion Lamar County in the opening round of State. The Canes, in a similar situation to Elbert, graduated four of their topfive scorers off a team that defeated Union County three times last season. However, two of those wins came by 3 points or fewer, including their 61-58 region tournament

## Panthers pull away from Tallulah and Towns, fall short at Fannin County

Union County picked up a pair of 20-point home victories over Tallulah Falls and Towns County before a narrow loss at Fannin County on Saturday, Dec. 7 closed out the week.

The Panthers will take Tuesday night off before beginning region play on Friday with the defending Region 8-AA Champion Elbert County at home. The following day, Union County will visit Monticello as the grueling region road slate gets underway.

Panthers 69, Towns County 49 - Trailing 23-22 at the break, Union County outscored Towns County 47-26 in the second half, and 20-4 down the stretch, to pick up its second-straight win as four different Panthers finished with double-digit point totals.

Holding a 43-39 advantage after three, Union County clamped down on the Indians over the final eight minutes, forcing Towns into 4-of-19 (26 percent) shooting from the floor. Senior Pierson Allison scored a team-high 21 points, going 5-for-5 at the line and hitting of 2-of-3 from long distance during the fourth quarter (2-for-6 overall) as the Panthers outscored the Indians 26-10 in the final frame.

Senior Sawyer Drake added 14 points, five assists, four rebounds and three blocks as Union improved to 2-3 on the year. Senior Sawyer Brey scored 11 points with six rebounds and four assists while fellow senior Kyle Morlock added 10 points, nine boards, four dimes and two blocks for the Panthers.

Towns County junior guard Kolby Moss poured in a game-high 27 points on 9-of-22 from the floor, 8-of-10 at the line but just 1-of-7 from downtown - his lone three com-



Moss' supporting cast, Aidan Berrong, Collin Crowder, Cabe Poston, Louis Quijada and Kyle Oakes combined to shoot just 9-for-37 (24-percent) overall, 1-for-8 (13-percent) at the line and 2-for-16 (13-percent) from 3-point range.

For the game, Towns County would hit only 30 percent (18-for-61) of its shots and 13-percent (3-for-24) from the half with the Indians leadbehind the arc while Union ing 23-22. County owned the interior outscoring the Indians 36-24 second half belonged to Towns in the paint and outrebounding them 44-32.
