

No. 9 Panthers take down 7-0 LFO, survive at Coahulla Creek

No. 3 North Cobb Christian rallies from 13 down in Union's first region loss

Region 7-AA is starting to come into focus as No. 9 Union County (7-2, 3-1) won two of three games last week, knocking off unbeaten Lakeview-Fort Oglethorpe (LFO) and Coahulla Creek before allowing a 13-point lead to slip away in a loss to No. 3 North Cobb Christian.

Entering the week, four unbeaten teams remained in 7-AA. Union took care of two of them in LFO and Coahulla Creek, setting up a meeting between the last two unbeatens on Saturday in Blairsville.

"Going into the week, I wanted to come out no worse than 2-1 and we did that,' Union County head coach Corey Garrett said. "There's still a lot of region games to play but we're in as good a spot that we can be in."

The Panthers are set to travel to Murray County on Tuesday, then take 10 days off before participating in the Battle of the States Christmas Tournament.

No.9 Panthers 62, LFO 48 - Union County outscored LFO 35-18 in the second half after trailing 30-27 at halftime. Maddox Young and Vince Marevka each scored 16 points to lead the Panthers to a victory over the previously unbeaten LFO on Dec. 10.

After a back-and-forth opening frame that concluded with Young connecting from 60 feet at the buzzer, the Panthers built a 22-16 advantage in the second before LFO closed on a 14-5 run.

"I challenged the guys at halftime," Garrett said. "I told them this game is yours for the taking. Own the moment. And we just came out with a different energy [in the second half]."

Threes by Hughes and Young to start the third tied things up at 33-33, then Young's floater and two Marevka buckets put Union up six at the 4:49 mark of the quarter, resulting in an LFO timeout.

Two more baskets by Marevka kept the lead at six, and Henry's trey bumped the margin to 46-37 with 2:40 left in the frame.

and Marevka stretched the lead to 50-42 before Marevka's layup opened up a 10-point margin with 6:47 to play.

downtown. Henry had 6 points, 7 assists and 7 rebounds; Kaden Combs had 4 points, 3 rebounds and 2 steals; Holden Payne ended with 4 points, 3 rebounds, an assist and a steal; Ethan Hogsed added 3 points, 1 rebound and 1 assist.

Marevka led the way with 8 boards while Young chipped in 2 boards, 2 assists and 2 steals.

No. 9 Panthers 53, Coahulla Creek 49 - Union County overcame a 5-point fourth-quarter deficit on the road, pushing ahead with a late bucket from Combs and gameclinching steals by Young and Hughes.

"We didn't shoot the ball well and it was our first game with more turnovers than assists," Garrett said. "We knew [Coahulla Creek] is a good team, and with their size, I think they could give North Cobb some problems."

With their team up six up a 24-14 lead in the second Hughes added another steal ling to the fourth, Young quarter thanks to back-to-back moments later, resulting in a 3-pointers from Hughes, but Henry free throw that sealed Coahulla Creek closed the gap to 27-21 at halftime and began the third quarter with a 10-1 run to take a 31-28 advantage. Union's first field goal of the half came from Henry, who hit a 3-pointer at the 3:31 mark to tie the game at 31-31. The Colts answered with a 5-0 points, 4 rebounds, 3 assists run and took a 40-35 lead into steals and an assist as Union

Union in a 42-37 hole until Young connected from beyond the arc with 5:20 to play. Later, with 3:58 remaining, Young's floater from 12 feet tied the game at 44-44.

Young delivered again, this time hitting a corner 3-pointer that put Union ahead 47-46, but Coahulla Creek responded with a triple to regain the lead with 1:42 left. Young hit 1 of 2 free throws on the ensuing Panthers possession. Henry then drew a charge with 1:03 remaining, setting up the go-ahead bucket.

Hughes and Henry each missed from deep, but Union secured the offensive rebound, and Combs converted a miss by Marevka to put his team ahead to stay at the 36-second mark. Following a timeout, the Panthers went up 52-49 when Young intercepted a Colts inbounds pass and hit two free The Panthers opened throws with 18 seconds left. the victory.

Hughes added 9 points, 14 rebounds and 2 steals; Henry went for 8 points, 5 rebounds, 5 assists and a steal; Payne had 8 points and a steal.

Marevka had 4 points, 6 boards and a block; Hogsed finished with 4 points, 1 rebound and an assist. Combs recorded 2 points, 5 rebounds and 2 steals.

No. 9 Panthers 65, No. **3** North Cobb Christian 76 - The Eagles entered ranked No. 3 among private schools in Georgia but found tough sledding early on, falling behind 24-13 during a heavyweight showdown in Blairsville on Saturday afternoon.

"We can play with anybody when we're locked in," Garrett said. "I told them before the game, 'Win, lose or draw, let's come out of this game sharper than when we went in."

The Panthers came out

firing and held a 21-11 advantage after one quarter before a 3-pointer from Hughes pushed the lead to 13 in the opening moments of the second. Union County hit four of its first six attempts from long distance to start the game, resulting in the 24-11 lead. North Cobb began chipping away, cutting the Panthers' lead to 35-30 by halftime.

The Eagles opened the third quarter with a 9-0 run before two free throws from Henry accounted for Union's first points of the half. North Cobb pushed its lead to 47-40 later in the frame, but Henry and Hughes quickly moved the Panthers within three. Two more free throws by Henry brought Union within two, but North Cobb's putback at the buzzer grew the difference to 52-48 entering the fourth.

The Eagles opened a 59-51 edge early in the fourth, but Union County fired back with consecutive 3-pointers from Hughes and one by Henry,

picked off an entry pass on the other end, but Hughes' goahead triple rattled out.

Down 63-60, the Panthers failed to capitalize on three North Cobb turnovers on the next four possessions, and an Eagles trey built a 6-point advantage with under 2:30 left. Hughes' 24-footer moved the Panthers back within three inside two minutes, but the offense went cold down the stretch as North Cobb scored two quick buckets and hit four free throws down the stretch to pull away.

"We were right there, then we had a couple unforced turnovers and took some bad shots," Garrett said. "We had a chance to win that game. We're not happy about it by any means, but I think we came out sharper. And now the goal is to continue building on that."

Henry scored a teamhigh 21 points to go with 6 rebounds, 6 assists and 2 steals. North Cobb's 6-foot-7

Union County pulls away from LFO, rallies at Coahulla Creek

North Cobb Christian upsets shorthanded Lady Panthers

Union County's rollercoaster week began with a win over Lakeview Fort-Oglethorpe, just hours after learning that three-year starter and allregion forward Katelyn Brown was done for the year with a hip injury.

Later in the week, the Lady Panthers (6-3, 2-2) rallied from a 12-point deficit on the road to defeat Coahulla Creek but suffered an upset home loss Saturday at the hands of North Cobb Christian while playing without 6-foot-1 senior Hope Taylor.

While Taylor's absence will be limited to just one game, the road only gets tougher for Union County as they travel to Murray County, the Region 7-AA first-place team, on Tuesday.

Lady Panthers 60, LFO 44 - Taylor scored a career-high 27 points, pulled down nine boards and blocked four shots as Union County outscored LFO 41-25 in the second half to pull away from a 19-19 tie.

"We struggled a little bit early on getting [Taylor] the ball," Union County head coach Thomas Nelson said. "In the second half she was able to catch the ball in better position and our girls were able to get it to her when she was open. She made some big plays'

Senior Ariel McCarter added 12 points, five rebounds and four assists in the win.

The Lady Panthers fell into an early 7-0 deficit but battled back to within 12-10 after the first quarter. Trailing 29-23 in the third, Union started to find an offensive rhythm when Nomi Nelson connected from 3-point range at the 4:35 mark.

Two free throws by McCarter moved the Lady Panthers within a point, and Sloane Dyer answered an LFO bucket with a game-tying trey. Later in the third, consecutive low-post baskets from Taylor and two more at the line by McCarter put Union County on top 39-33 at the quarter's end.

Taylor opened the fourth with another bucket down low, and Mady Adams hit from 15 feet to keep the cushion at 43-36. Taylor scored again to build a 10-point lead with 4:11 remaining, and then Mc-Carter's 3 opened up a 51-40 advantage on the ensuing pos-

Additionally, Union County applied full court pressure in the second half, resulting in turnovers and fast break opportunities.

"When we can make teams play a little bit faster, that's an advantage for us," Coach Nelson said.

Less than 3 minutes into the quarter, Dyer cashed in a 48-47 lead, Nelson stepped her steal with a triple on the other end, and then Taylor scored on a putback, bringing Union within two, 32-30, at the 4-minute mark.

McCarter had 7 points, 5 rebounds, 5 assists, 2 steals and 2 blocks. Taylor, who spent much of the night in foul trouble, had 5 points, 4 boards, 2 steals and 2 blocks. Akins had 2 points, 4 rebounds, 2 assists and 2 steals. McKenna Hood added 2 points and a steal. Mady Adams had 4 rebounds, an assist and a block.

North Cobb Christian 56, Union County 47 - Playing without its star center, the Lady Panthers never led as NCC built an early 10-0 lead en route to a 9-point win on

"It was very frustrating," Coach Nelson said. "We had so many opportunities to chop away at their lead or go ahead, but couldn't get it done.'
