Point 27 ministry provides 'Shields of Strength' to LEOs

Point 27 is a nonprofit volunteer ministry with a straightforward mission: "to strengthen and encourage members of the Armed Forces, First Responders, Veterans and their family members with

Organization representatives do this by giving out free scripture-engraved dog tags they call "Shields of Strength" to soldiers and first responders, as well as scripture-engraved Folded Flag necklaces to family members of fallen soldiers and first responders.

A major goal of this ministry is to provide a Thin Blue Line dog tag to every U.S. law enforcement officer, and last week, two Point 27 volunteers carried out this mission locally by stopping into

Sheriff's Cpl. Rick Johnson of Florida got involved with Point 27 after his brother-in-law Carl McKellar, who works in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, started volunteering for the organization.

The two men traveled to the area recently to spend Thanksgiving with family members who live in the area, and while they were here, they decided to honor local law enforcement with "Shields of Strength."

For 20 years now, the Blairsville Police Department has worked to enrich the lives of underprivileged children in the community with the annual Shop with a Cop for Christmas

And thanks to yet another year of overwhelming generosity by businesses, organizations and individuals in the community, the department will be able to benefit more local children than ever before.

It works like this – the Saturday before the last day of in-person classes before Christmas break at Union County Schools, participating children and Shop with a Cop volunteers meet at the middle school prior to making their way via school bus to Walmart to get some shopping done.

At Walmart, the kids pair off with a chaperone who walks them around the store and assists them in keeping track of their Christmas budget, as each child gets an amount of money thanks to community donations to guarantee presents under their family tree come

The time these chaperones spend shopping with the kids acts as a great mentorship opportunity, helping to build trust between local law enforcement and future productive members of Society.

Year after year, the

for January safety projects airsville Airport prepares

editor@nganews.com Work on a set of safety projects at the Blairsville Municipal Airport will begin in the new year, to include runway rejuvenation, displacing of runway thresholds and installation of a PAPI system.

Mayor Jim Conley and Airport Manager Aaron Mannheim met with the various project stakeholders - representatives with project manager Croy Engineering, contractor Remac, and Georgia Department of Transportation construction will occur after the of the runway," according

Aviation – for a Nov. 23 preconstruction conference.

In this meeting at the W.C. Nelson Terminal, they went over final details of the work that is expected to start in early January 2021. Remac will have 60 calendar days to complete the projects once

work begins, excluding delays for abnormal weather. Blairsville Airport will have to be closed for at least two weeks during the project, with potential intermittent

open and close dates depending

on the weather. Fortunately,

holidays, when traffic is slower at the airport. The extent of the work

will include sealing cracks and applying a light coat of asphalt to rejuvenate the decades-old runway; remarking and moving lighting at both ends of the runway to improve approach safety from either direction by aircraft in relation to obstacles

near the airport; and installing a PAPI system. "A displaced threshold is a threshold located at a point on the runway other than the designated beginning to the Federal Aviation Administration. "Displacement of a threshold reduces the length of runway available for

'The portion of runway behind a displaced threshold is available for takeoffs in either direction and landings from the opposite direction. As for PAPIs, or Precision

Approach Path Indicators, such systems assist pilots with visual guidance when landing, telling them, for example, whether they're coming in too high, too low or just right. See Airport, Page 3A
