murky due to the fog of time, but the Blairsville Airport reportedly once had visual approach slope indicator lights many years ago, before the last runway extension in the early 1990s

Wiring for a PAPI was apparently completed at the time of the extension, but the system was not installed.

It has been a goal of the city and GDOT to install PAPI ever since the Dec. 19, 2018, nighttime plane crash on Kings Road that killed three people and critically injured a fourth. The crash is still under investigation by the National Transportation Safety Board.

As previously reported, the FAA advised the city to discontinue landings after dark following the crash, though pilots rated for general aviation may still land at night.

According to Airport Manager Mannheim, Blairsville's runway lights are rated medium intensity, not high intensity, so the airport supports daytime-only



The history is a little operations for charter flights but does allow landings after dark for personal flights meeting FAA requirements.

Funding for the upcoming construction was approved in the Blairsville City Council's Nov. 3 regular meeting. All told, the projects will cost \$392,471, to be funded primarily using federal and state dollars, with a \$27,330 local match.

"Blairsville Airport is located 3 miles southwest of Blairsville's central business district situated on 156 acres and owned and operated by the City of Blairsville," according to GDOT. "The airport has a 5,006-foot asphalt runway, Runway 8/26.'

Continuing, "Blairsville Airport plays a key role in meeting place for many supporting area businesses ... The manufacturing industry has a significant presence in the area .. (and) the area's economy is heavily tied to tourism, thanks to the abundant recreational opportunities in the vicinity and numerous hospitality industry businesses.

Additionally, the airport supports "flight training, forest firefighting, aerial inspections and surveys, law enforcement flights, search and rescue operations, environmental patrols, and real estate tours."

"It serves as a different organizations, including Drug Enforcement Administration, Immigration and Customs Enforcement. and Transportation Security Administration," according to GDOT. "Life Flight helicopters, Angel Flights, VET Flights and Humane Society Rescue Flights, whose services inherently enhance the quality of local life, also utilize the airport.

"The local EAA chapter has (annual) fly-in cookouts .. which attract over 150 people. and offer Young Eagle youth outreach events. The Civil Air Patrol conducts search and rescue operations. Blairsville Municipal Airport also serves as a field trip location for local

"A lot of what we did was what we normally do," Harper said. "That is just trying to create a sense of normalcy this time of year.

Market Manager Micky Cummings said he is looking forward to this final market of keeping people safe and providing an outlet for local farmers to sell, even amid COVID-19.

"It has been a good year for us," Cummings said. "We had to operate under different circumstances than in the past, but we did it safely. Hopefully, this coming Saturday will be no exception. We try to operate as safe as we can and are thankful for our vendors and community for working with us to do so."
