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Hill named superintendent sole finalist in BOE meeting

Union County's own John Hill is set to become the next superintendent of Union County Schools.

The Union County Board of Education voted unanimously in its Dec. 12 board meeting to name Hill the sole finalist for the position.

"We as a board are fortunate we were part of the process of finding the person that will lead us into the future," said Board Chair Cindy Odom that evening. "We considered options and considered doing a statewide search or looking locally.

"We decided we have

so many quality employees to absorb as much knowledge at Union County Schools, we as he can from the departing superintendent. wanted to open it up on a local level first. Which, we did that,

'I'm very honored," said Hill following the meeting. "It's a very serious thing to me to do the right thing for the kids and our community, but first of all the children.'

His wife, Jessica, was right by his side during the meeting, as the board made clear its intention to hire Hill to be the next superintendent of Union County Schools.

'I appreciate the support of my wife and my family," said Hill, before commenting on his goal moving forward. "At the end of the day, I want this school system to be judged by the employability and the success of our graduates. That's truly what matters."

Hill, who is himself a Union County graduate, has served in pretty much every educational role within the school system since first coming aboard in 2004.

He's been a teacher and coach, a school principal and board administrator, and now, he'll be the next superintendent of Union County Schools.

The task won't be easy - the system has performed at the very top of the Pioneer RESA for the last two years running, though Hill said he is ready to pick up where Dr. Rayfield will be leaving off.

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Blairsville mayor urges water customers to join UCWENS

Blairsville Mayor Jim Conley is asking Blairsville City Water customers to sign up for the Union County Wireless **Emergency** Notification System.

His calls for water customers to sign up for UCWENS come after the city had to issue a systemwide Boiled Water Advisory on Monday, Nov. 27.

That advisory lasted several days and caught many water customers off guard, including businesses and others that had to shut down or make special accommodations due to state law regulating potable water sources during such advisories.

The benefit of signing up for the alert system is that

residents will know right away via text messages, emails and phone calls the next time an advisory is put into place, and theoretically with more notice than the Nov. 27 advisory.

People can also receive targeted alerts through UCWENS based on their physical address,

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
