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Program provides Christmas for foster children

Imagine spending Christmas without family that's what it's like being a foster child on Christmas

Thankfully, the Towns and Union Foster Children's Enrichment Program has been hard at work gathering donations made by generous individuals to provide rewarding and positive Christmas experiences for children who are currently caught in the legal system.

The program, a nonprofit entity, is carried out by former and current CASA volunteers that's Court Appointed Special Advocates for children.

Because the identities of children in foster care are kept secret for their own protection, people who decide to sponsor a foster child never know the name of the kid they are helping

On the other hand, the child gets to fill out their very own wish list to be used by a sponsor for shopping, so it's almost as if each sponsor is Santa Claus for a special child in need.

The process begins around the first of September, as program co-founder Pat Elliott begins rounding up a master list of children who will benefit from the yearly Christmas program. This year, that number is just over 100.

Once the group figures out who all they're going to be helping - with anonymity intact, of course - foster parents receive blank wish lists to be

filled out by the children.

"Over the years, we've developed a big list of sponsors," said Richard Paolillo, another of the program's co-founders. "We'll send the sponsors a list, and they'll buy the items on the list. We also get cash donations, too, which comes in handy because we always have to buy extra (to finish filling in some wish lists). It's grown over the years, because some sponsors have been with us for a long time." The program was

founded years ago by now ex-CASAs Elliott, Paolillo and his wife Mary Jane, as well as Sherry Wendt, in order to fill a need for kids when other programs fell through due to the economic recession.

When David Burnette pulled out of Station No. 2 last Friday afternoon, it became immediately apparent that something was wrong.

Burnette, a volunteer firefighter and first lieutenant in charge of the Station 2 area, had taken the lead in Engine 2. He was being following by Tanker 2 on a call to a smoke alarm.

Instead of completing the turn out of the station and onto Jones Creek Road, the engine carried on across the road, over a corner of land onto old Blue Ridge Highway, all the way across it, off the other side, through a fence, then into a power pole, according to Union County Fire Chief David Dyer.

Bystanders reported witnessing Burnette seemingly unconscious behind the


