Lady Panthers look to take a winning record into Battle of the States

Union halts three-game losing streak, can improve to 6-5 with wins on Monday and Thursday

Union County's girls saw their record drop from 3-2 last week to 3-5 this week but managed to right the ship with a three-point victory in Hayesville, NC on Saturday night.

Leading by as many as 10 in the third quarter, the Lady Panthers went ice-cold for much of the fourth quarter until a Bailey Daniel trey bailed out her team and allowed Union to escape North Carolina with the win.

Earlier in the week, the Lady Panthers fell to 1-2 inside Region 7-AAA when they suffered an ugly 77-27 loss to private school powerhouse Greater Atlanta Christian on Tuesday, then faltered late in a 64-57 loss to North Hall on Friday. The Lady Panthers ap-

peared to have control during the first half vs North Hall, but the Lady Trojans turned up the heat on the defensive end coming out of the intermission and Union was limited to just 23 second half points after scorching the nets for 34 points during the first two quarters. As a result, North Hall snatched the lead away during the final minute of the third and extended their advantage to as many as nine during the fourth.

This week Union hosts a pair of winnable games at home when they host Andrews, NC on Monday and Gilmer County on Thursday.

A pair of wins will send the Lady Panthers into the Battle of the States on a three-game winning streak with a 6-5 record as they seek their first ever BOTS Championship.

Lady Panthers ventured across the border on Saturday and ended a three-game slide despite watching a 10-point cushion evaporate into thin air, forcing them to scratch-and-claw for a 43-40 victory.

With 1:19 to play and Union trailing by two, junior Bailey Daniel nailed a go-ahead trey from the right wing to put the Lady Panthers on top 38-37. Hayesville missed their go-ahead basket but a Union miss at the foul line left the door open for

securing the offensive board. immediately attacked the basket Freshman Andelin Hill sank two clutch free throws to extend the advantage to five with 14 seconds left.

The Lady Jackets refused to surrender quietly and hit a corner trey with under 5 seconds to play to pull back within two. With 1.5 seconds left, Daniel hit the first of two free throws and Hayesville came down with the rebound as time expired. However, Lady Jacket coach Chad McClure was awarded a time out and one full second was put back on the clock with his team trailing by three.

Hayesville's full court. desperation heave was picked off by senior Ashley Fair to preserve the victory.

Union County led for most of the first three quarters after taking a 21-18 advantage into halftime and opening the third quarter on an 8-1 run that gave the Lady Panthers a comfortable 29-19 lead with 4:05 to play in the period. Both offenses would struggle to put points on the board for the remainder of the third but the Lady Jackets were able to seize momentum when they banked in a long 2-point jump shot at the buzzer to pull within six at 31-25.

Freshman Brooke Dockrey finished with 5 points and 2 assists. Sophomore Jordan Rogers chipped in 4 points.

UC 57, North Hall 64 Daniel scored 19 of her team-high 25 points in the first half but it wasn't enough to hold off the Lady Trojans who rallied from six down to lead by as many as nine in the fourth quarter.

With 1:36 left in the third, McCarter gave Union a 43-40 advantage with a put-back but Daniel went to the bench with her fourth foul at the 1:04 mark and North Hall responded with a 6-0 spurt to close the period.

The Lady Trojans opened the fourth with a pair of perfect trips to the charity stripe to extend their lead to 50-43 with just under seven minutes to play. Daniel hit 1-of-2 at the line on the other end, then Brooke Dockrey drove the lane and scored on a nifty up-and-under, finger-roll lay-in. Unable to capitalize on a North Hall turnover, the Lady Trojans ended their mini-scoring drought with a bucket at the 4:50 mark but McCarter went back to work on the offensive glass and pulled her team back within four.

A missed 3-pointer by North Hall resulted in a long-Dockrey to make it a two-point game at 52-50 with 4:11 remaining. However, the next six points belonged to the Lady Trojans as they opened up a 58-50 lead with 2:48 showing on the clock.

Brooke Dockrey hit 1-of-2 at the line on the heels of a North Hall bucket but Fair picked up her fifth foul with 46 seconds to play and her team down by seven. The Lady Trojans essentially put the game away with two free throws to take a 62-53 lead.

McCarter would convert a put-back with 33 seconds left, then she added a lay-up as the clock ticked under 10 seconds, to bring the final score to 64-57.

For the game, Union County shot 21-for-39 from the floor (54 percent) but 24 turnovers were the difference maker. After a red-hot first half from beyond-the-arc, the Lady Panthers shot 0-for-7 from downtown in the second half and finished 4-for-14 overall - with all four treys coming from Daniel, who shot 4-of-7 for the game with 25 points and 2 steals.

McCarter posted another double-double with 14 points and 11 boards, Brooke Dockrey added 10 points and 2 assists, while Adeline Dockrey had 5 points and 8 rebounds.

Union drops to 1-2 in region play following one-sided losses to North Hall, at GAC

Following a pair of blowout losses in region play, the Panthers ended their three-game slide in a non-region contest at Hayesville, Sitting at 3-6 with two

games to play before the Battle of States opens on Dec. 28, Union can possibly even their record before the end of the 2016 calendar year. After suffering a 75-31 loss

at Greater Atlanta Christian on Tuesday and giving up 13 treys in a 70-47 defeat to North Hall on Friday, the Panthers still have a chance to build some momentum before dealing with the meat and potatoes of the region schedule.
