assortment of vegetables for meals in the detention center kitchens.

Beans, squash, cucumbers, tomatoes, potatoes, cabbage, collard greens, peppers, corn and other home-grown veggies are now served during chow time, allowing the state to allocate those funds elsewhere.

Along with saving money, providing the inmates with another tool for life on the outside, like gardening skills, reduces recidivism rates statewide.

"We're on track now to save (taxpayers) over \$5,000, and that's very conservative," said Colwell PDC Detail Sergeant Richard Griggs, who is also responsible for the garden program. "Plus, if you have a well-fed detainee, they don't get into as much trouble.

"We're trying to instill in these guys a really good work ethic, and they're seeing the results from their efforts and they're really starting to take ownership of it. Also, when they work in this garden all day, they're too tired to get into trouble in the evenings.'

According to Sergeant Griggs, some detainees work full-time in the garden, while other works two to three days per week, with numerous others who have requested a spot in the garden.

"It's a win-win situation," Sergeant Griggs added. "I've had (detainees) tell me, 'My mother has always wanted a garden, but I didn't know how. Now when I get out, I can help her put a garden in.

The garden began five years ago and has grown each and every year since, and according to PDC Food Service Manager Tammy Bracken, the detainees begin planting in early spring and will harvest up until mid to late autumn when the frosts hit.

In fact, the production is so great that many of the vegetables will be frozen and stored, and won't be eaten until the winter. Last year, the PDC had such a tremendous surplus of cabbage that the extras were donated to Lee Arrendale State Prison in Alto.

"The guys harvest it from the garden, then bring it to the kitchen where the kitchen detainees cut it, prep it, then bag and freeze what we're not going to use so we don't lose anything," Bracken said.

The man who oversees the garden, Sergeant Griggs, also volunteers his spare time


