Enotah CASA Pam Curley Enotah CASA is a nonprofit organization with the goal of ensuring that every child has a safe, permanent home. They do this by providing specially trained volunteers known as CASAs,

Sen. Gooch ready for 2018 session of Georgia General Assembly

District 51 State Sen. Steve Gooch joined lawmakers from all across the state to begin the 2018 Legislative Session of the Georgia General Assembly on Monday, Jan. 8.

The start of a new session always tends to be a little chaotic for legislators, as they prepare to upend their daily routines back home for a threemonth stint at the Georgia State Capitol each year.

"You're scrambling around the last week or so, trying to get loose ends tied up at work and at home," said Sen. Gooch. "At the same time, you're trying to transition into a mindset of, well, what are the issues that are going to be facing us on Day One through Day 40?

"And what issues do I have in my district that I need to make sure I take care of, as far as local legislation or budget issues, projects that may need some attention?

"So, it's a game of juggling about six or eight balls at the same time. There's also a lot of excitement in it, so you get a huge adrenalin rush because of all the deadlines and all the exciting things that are going to go on." Sen. Gooch first won

election to the Georgia Senate in 2010, and the 2018 session will be his eighth since taking office for the first time in January 2011, so he's no stranger to the Capitol.

"But I've never been through a year to where it's an election year for the governor and lieutenant governor, the secretary of state and all the other offices that are wide open," said Sen. Gooch. These are vacant seats that a new person is going to be elected to.

'Before, basically, the people that were there were running for re-election. This year, all of those constitutional offices at the top, those Top 3, are going to be vacated, and so it's going to really change,

I think, the dynamic of the whole process.

Continued Gooch: "So, it's going to be a little different for me not knowing what to expect on that, but I'm just going to focus on my district and the needs of North Georgia, and not worry too much about the politics of this statewide business that may

rear its ugly head.'

Over the last several years, Sen. Gooch has dedicated much of his time to finding a solution to rural broadband issues throughout his district, which includes Fannin, Union, Gilmer, Lumpkin, White, Dawson and parts of Pickens and Forsyth counties.

'We've got some real serious issues around the state, primarily in rural Georgia," said Gooch. "We have incumbent internet providers who are providing, I would call it a substandard service at best in some of those areas.

"And it's because of the rapid change in technology, and the huge, rapid increase in demand for more bandwidth. Every kid in the home now has two or three devices.

"You've got all of these huge six-foot and seven-foot flat screen TVs that pull down a lot of internet bandwidth when they're playing videos and movies. You've got all these Netflix movies being
