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Horinek claims 2017 STAR Student honors at UCHS

Even though Maddie Horinek was certainly satisfied with her SAT score, it came as a pleasant surprise when she learned she'd been named 2017 STAR Student at Union County High School.

To be nominated as a STAR Student, a high school senior is required to have the highest score for any single sitting of the SAT through November of their senior year, and be in the Top 10 percent or Top 10 students of their class based on grade-point average.

Once nominated, students then select a STAR Teacher representative of their academic success – a teacher who has particularly inspired them toward higher achievements in their high school careers.

Horinek's favorite subjects

are math and science, thanks in large part to her natural problem solving abilities and the teachers who have fostered her abilities in those areas.

Enter Mark Donahue. who taught Horinek in Honors Chemistry, Honors Physics I and AP Physics C: Mechanics.

"I knew right away that I wanted to nominate Mr. Donahue," said Horinek. "The first class I took with him was chemistry, and that's kind of where I started getting interested in science. The class was stressful, but I really enjoyed it.

"I think that's why I want to major in chemistry, potentially, because I really enjoyed the class and I feel like I learned a lot from him.

For his part, Donahue considers Horinek to be one of the brightest and kindest students he's had the privilege of teaching

A Union County grad himself, Donahue has been teaching at UCHS for 25 years, and what he has enjoyed most about Horinek as a student is her knack for applied knowledge.

"That's what sets her apart from so many other students," said Donahue. "She's not about getting a grade - she's about learning content, and is excited about applying that in all parts of her life.

"I've been fortunate enough to have Maddie in three different classes, and I've watched her grow in that respect, which is just a thing of beauty. That's what we do this job for, that's what it's about."

Added Donahue: "I've taught a lot of students over a lot of years, and she is by far one of the best students I've ever encountered in my history of teaching. If you ask any other faculty member

here, they would say the exact same thing.'

Break in Notla Water main results in 'Boil Water Advisory'

The Notla Water Authority issued a Boil Water Advisory to all Notla customers on Wednesday, Feb. 1, after a main break in the system earlier that same morning.

At 4 a.m. that Wednesday, there was a break in a 12-inch main line located behind The Sanctuary at Lake Nottely community on Murphy Highway. The break happened away from residences.

Because the break occurred so early in the morning, water consumption and use was low, so it took water workers longer to find the exact location of the break. Nevertheless, Notla Water Authority pinpointed the source of the leak and began immediate repairs within two hours of the break.

The authority determined that the break was caused by a couple of compounding factors, such as the age of the pipe in conjunction with alternating cold and warm weather patterns in recent

Blue Ridge Mountain EMC General Manager Jeremy Nelms and EMC Board President Mickey Cummings stopped by the North Georgia News offices last Friday with a few updates on the EMC in 2017.

For starters, Nelms touched briefly on his transition into the EMC, which he has helmed since July of 2016.

"Right now, I'm slowly but surely getting my arms around the organization, all the ins and outs," said Nelms. "It's been a little bit of a learning curve, because the way an EMC works here in North Georgia is a little different than the way an EMC works in a metropolitan area of North Florida.'

A few of the differences Nelms noted between working in the North Georgia Mountains and his former EMC in Florida were the mountainous terrain. frequently windy climate, and occasional bouts of snow.

GDOT to hold Feb. 21 meeting on Murphy Hwy. project

The Georgia Department of Transportation has been notifying community leaders about an upcoming meeting to discuss the widening to four lanes of a roughly 9-mile stretch of Murphy Highway.

Billed as a Public Information Open House, the meeting will take place on Tuesday, Feb. 21, from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. at the Haralson Memorial Civic Center, and will feature information on the

proposed project. GDOT officials will be present during the meeting to answer questions and take comments on the project, and they have encouraged residents to attend.

Currently, the project aims to widen Murphy Highway,

also known as SR 11/US 129, to four lanes. The widening will occur in the nearly 9-mile stretch of Murphy Highway between Blue Ridge Street North and Nottely Dam Road, with potential project costs
