## Community comes together; supports CTAE programs

It has been said that it takes a village to raise a child, but getting the village together in the first place can be a challenge these days.

Enter Josh Davis, the new CTAE director at Union County Schools.

Earlier this month, Davis convened a meeting of stakeholders from across the spectrum of community life in Union County, to hold districtwide CTAE Advisory Board meetings, inside the Union County Community Center.

CTAE stands for Career, Technical and Agricultural Education, and is all about making sure that students are equipped to take advantage of

many opportunities after they graduate high school.

"Through partnerships with all stakeholders... we can greatly impact our community and future workforce by providing career exploration, training, and internships at the high school level," said Davis, who considered the discussions that day a win for students.

The schools' CTAE Advisory Board is made up of more than a hundred people, featuring business leaders, parents, students, teachers, school administrators and board of education members, all with the goal of strengthening the ties between the various elements of the community.

Discussions during the Oct. 5 meeting centered on

enhancing the system's many CTAE programs, and advisory board members split up into different program areas to talk about how to get students more real-world experience before they graduate.

The state requires the schools to hold advisory board meetings twice a year, and since it's usually difficult to coordinate schedules for all parties involved, this year, the schools decided to have one big meeting with everyone.

Union County Schools Superintendent Dr. Fred Rayfield said he was excited to have so much involvement in the meeting, as dozens of people turned out to offer input and work on expanding local opportunities for students.

As Dr. Rayfield stated in the meeting, CTAE Advisory

Boards have been around for decades, and in his long career as an educator, Rayfield has

seen more than his fair share of advisory board meetings. "This is probably the

biggest (advisory board meeting) I have ever been to in 29 years," said Dr. Rayfield to those gathered that day. "And that speaks volumes for the community."

"We've got student participation, we've got governmental participation, we have business and industry, we've got educators. We've got a very, very diverse group of people and backgrounds sitting at the table, ready to exchange ideas. And folks, that does not happen in a lot of places."

The Union County Schools' CTAE program contains the following areas of concentration: automotive, business, computer science, engineering, food science,

## UCSO website features more information

The Union County Sheriff's Office has a state of the art website that has been a work in progress.

That project has come to fruition, Union County Sheriff's Office Detective Lt. Daren Osborn said.

The website, http://www.unioncountygasheriff.org, comes complete with much information. It's a one-stop shop for all things related to the Union County Sheriff's Office.

It comes complete with a breakdown of each department, from Administration, to the K-9 Unit. It also includes Union County Jail information, breaking down details that include that there are 54 beds for general housing and three beds for observation.

Also, that there are three meals served per day, which include two hot meals and one cold meal. Other details include that there is full-time medical assistance available, which includes a Licensed Practicing Nurse, who is onsite seven



UCSO Det. Marc Pilote says a week. A doctor also is available through Tele-Med 24/7.

Jail information also includes a list of current inmates, however, inmate photographs are not available, per state code section O.C.G.A. 50-18-72, Lt. Osborn said.

The inmate information available via the website includes bond information, the number of days the inmate has been incarcerated, and
