bers, since new ones are not available vet)

A. For 2013, the mill rate for Union County was 5.410 as compared to Lumpkin County at 10.436, Rabun County – 8.170, Habersham County – 9.635, White County – 9.190, Banks County – 8.979 and Towns County at 5.760. These are very large differences other than Towns County.

Q. What do the different mill rates mean in actual property taxes we pay?

A. Well for a comparison, if you had a house and land (without homestead exemption) worth \$200,000 in Union County (does not include school tax) you would pay \$432.00. In Lumpkin you would pay \$834.88, in Rabun County you would pay \$653.60, Habersham, \$770.80, White you would pay \$770.80, Banks you would pay \$718.32, and Towns you would pay \$460.80. So other than Towns, our property taxes are considerably lower than other counties in our region.

Calculation of property tax in this example - House and land value \$200,000 x 40 percent (assessed value) = \$80,000. So for all of the examples above, even though the property is worth \$200,000, in Georgia you only pay property taxes on 40 percent (assessed value) or \$80,000 x mill rate (80,000 x .005410) =

Q. How are the school and county property taxes divided up?

A. In the example above of a home and /or property worth \$200,000 (taxable value of \$80,000 again with no homestead or other exemptions to make this more simple) you would take our total tax rate of the county 5.410 mils x \$80,000 = \$432.00. The school mill rate is  $11.798 \times \$80,000 = \$973.84$ (the school also has one of the lowest mill rates in the state). So the total property tax bill would be \$1,405.84, with a very small portion going to the state. This works out to 31 percent going to the county and 68 percent going to the school system.

Q. How much of the county budget is spent on salaries as opposed to operations?

A. This is one of the areas I am most impressed with in Union County. The dedication and hard work of our employees have a lot to do with this. We have fewer employees working harder and because of that, our total salaries account for only 46.32 percent of our budget, while our operation cost are 53.68 percent of our budget. Most counties salaries are at least 60 percent of their budget if not more. So the property taxes we collect of \$6,600,000 barely pay for the employee cost of \$ 6,340,863. Our operation budget is \$7,347,595 and most of these funds do not come from property taxes but from all other revenues of the county including fees, fines and forfeitures and LOST sales taxes.

Without bragging too much, this all means that Union County is one of the most financially sound and fiscally strong counties in Georgia (for our size). While no one likes to pay property taxes, we really get a lot for our money in this county in terms of great parks and facilities, great services including all public safety, roads and bridges and county maintenance, a good court system, and a great Recreation Department, plus outstanding county employees and elected officials.

We all thank you for supporting our county, paying your property taxes and helping to make this one of the best counties anywhere with an exceptional quality of life at the lowest possible cost. We hope you all have a Happy and more importantly, Healthy 2014!

He would cut up the fruit and pass a piece to you on the end of the knife. Patiently, you waited your turn. It always seemed like a gift, because it was delivered with such love and grace. This ritual was one passed down from generations, for meal time was synonymous with family time in the

Sicilian culture. Family time is precious. As parents and grandparents, we can't underestimate what these little traditions like making cookies at Christmas or letting the grandkids argue who is going to fight over the wishbone on Thanksgiving means to them later in life. We don't have to succumb to the "modern" version of mealtime, with cell phones buzzing and TV on for background noise. We can capture their concentration by giving them our full attention. By sharing with them stories of our past that they may not seem to find totally captivating at the time, they will remember and they will share with their children someday.
