trout streams; help maintain the biodiversity of the ecosystem and protect the air and water quality we depend on; and create special places that restore our bodies and refresh our spirits.

But Arbor Day is more than a time for reflection. It's also a time for action to save one of our most majestic and iconic evergreen trees. The hemlocks are being attacked and killed by the millions by a tiny invasive insect, the hemlock woolly adelgid, that was accidentally imported from Asia to the eastern U.S. more than 60 years ago and now infests the entire Appalachian chain. The bad news – the massive loss of the hemlock would be a disaster on the scale of the American Chestnut.

The good news – property owners can treat and save as many of their own trees as they choose. It's safe, easy enough for most people to do themselves, highly effective, and surprisingly economical, especially compared to the cost of losing the trees. And volunteers can help save the hemlocks in our national forests and state lands too.

ne, red onion and some garbanzo beans and salt and pepper to taste. Lip smacking.

For a Latin flair, change the fresh basil to cilantro, use lime juice instead of the balsamic, and then toss in some chopped jalapeno, cherry tomatoes, chopped green onions, a can of black beans and a chopped avocado. Greek is also very doable. Use a combination of zucchini and cucumber as your spiral raw spaghetti, and trade the herbs to oregano and parsley, olive oil, adding lemon juice as your acid, crumbled feta cheese, sliced kalamata olives, chopped red onion and serve with a warm pita.

Feel like Asian tonight? Let's switch to making our cold pasta out of yellow squash instead. Our marinade will be 2 teaspoons of soy sauce, 2 teaspoons of teriyaki sauce, a tablespoon of sugar, a ¼ cup of olive (or peanut) oil and a 1/4 cup of rice vinegar. Sprinkle the pasta with just a dash of Chinese 5 spice, then add the marinade. Toss well and let sit in the refrigerator till minutes before you are ready to serve. Now add the following chopped items: green onions, snow peas, red or yellow pepper, radish, celery, water chestnuts (canned) and cashews. Toss and serve immediately. For an added touch, sprinkle each serving with some toasted

These spiralized veggie noodles are wonderful in soups, too. Just add them to any of your soup broths just minutes before serving. They don't take long to cook soft. I also use cauliflower for my cut pasta substitutes, such as ditilini, acini pepe or even ziti. Cut it, steam it and then serve it as if you would the pasta. Cauliflower Ziti with a Bolognese sauce is delicious, nutritious and glutton free.

I will talk more next week about the virtues of the cauliflower, but before I close this week, let me tell you my Trash to Treasures breakfast I devoured, today. With cauliflower being in such demand, the prices are sky high on this gem of a veggie. Most of you who buy a head of cauliflower, take all the green leafy thick stems surrounding the florets and trash them. In my Sicilian family, these leaves were treasured. They were boiled until fork tender, then served hot with garlic and olive oil or small pasta was thrown in and a soup was made from the broth and leaves, served with freshly ground pepper, olive oil and lots of fresh grated parmesan. I had these cooked cauliflower leaves I had saved in the fridge this morning. I sautéed them in some butter,
