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Snowstorm headed our way; Gov. Deal declares state of emergency

Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris summoned all county emergency personnel and public safety workers for a briefing on the two-phase snowstorm expected to pound Union County Tuesday morning until late Thursday.

Paris told the group that the county has seven snowplows, with two new smaller units that could be utilized to keep ahead of the storm.

"We're going to get out early and pretreat the roads,' Paris said. "Georgia Department of Transportation has three plows to keep the state routes clear. We've also got Colwell, Colditz and Rich to help if need be.

"We'll have four graders out at night," he said. "We'll pretreat bridges that go to the larger subdivisions in case we can't get to them once the weather starts.

"Gov. Deal has declared

a state of emergency for the Pickens, Dawson, Lumpkin mountain counties," Paris and White counties. said

According to Gov. Deal's office, a state of emergency has been declared in Cherokee, Forsyth, Hall, Banks, Jackson, Murray, Fan-

The weather service predicts snow accumulations of 1 to 3 inches in the first phase of the snowstorm.

It was unclear when Union County Schools Supernin, Gilmer, Union, Towns, intendent Gary Steppe would

make a decision related to school closings.

Steppe said a decision could come as late as Monday afternoon.

At press time, no decision had been made. Paris said the weather

forecast had a bright spot.

"The weather service is calling for wet snow, and that's good news for us," Paris said. "We can get the majority of the snow off the roadways. We expect Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday to be dead days in Union County." Blue Ridge Mountain EMC General Manager Matthew Akins said his biggest concern is that the heavy snow is likely to weigh on power lines and trees, creating havoc for electric customers.

NWS: 'significant weather events headed to North Georgia Mountains'

Gov. Nathan Deal has issued a State of Emergency for the North Georgia Mountains as significant snowfall is expected through Thursday.

The mountains could experience more than 10 inches of snow during that time frame, according to the National Weather Service.

The weather service projects 1-3 inches of snow Tuesday, with an additional 4-6 inches of snow on Wednesday.

The precipitation in the North Georgia Mountains is expected to remain snow during the aforementioned weather events.

The weather service is calling the storm two events, with Monday into Tuesday the first event, and Tuesday

into Wednesday the second event.

The events are expected to be separated by 12-18 hours, according to the weather service.

The second event could last into Thursday, according

The heavy snow totals could impact power lines and cause outages.

Unlike the Jan. 28 snowstorm, which produced a stubborn dry snow, the oncoming snowstorm is expected to bring a wet, heavy snow, more likely to impact power lines and trees.

Tuesday's snowstorm calls for an 80 percent chance of two inches of snow or more, according to the weather service.

According to the weather service, the precipitation in the North Georgia Mountains is expected to remain all snow, with no accumulation of ice, which is projected for the Metro Atlanta area.

Temperatures will continue to fall into the 20s on
