Tiger - Apparently Winter Storm Pax is anxious for the Region 8-AA Tournament to get underway this week at Rabun County High School.


Originally, Union County was set to open postseason play on Tuesday with the 3rd seeded Lady Panthers taking on No. 6 Oglethorpe County in the opening round of the Region 8-AA Tournament.

The 5th place Panthers were scheduled to meet No. 4 Washington-Wilkes on Wednesday but with Pax expected to wallop Northeast Georgia with more than 4-6 inches of snow, the first round opened Monday at 3 p.m. with the Panthers and Tigers squaring off in a rematch of last year's opening round

The Lady Panthers immediately followed, and unless Pax arrived several hours ahead of schedule, the opening round will be in the books, and 8-AA 's four State Tournament representatives will be set.

And while half of the men and women's teams in the Region will be granted at least another week to their season, the other half will be packing it up and heading home until

After losing twice to both Jefferson and Rabun, Coach Tucker said he would rather play Jefferson in the semifinals but isn't looking past Oglethorpe. 'It doesn't really mat-

ter to me but I'd prefer to avoid Rabun until the end, but right now, my only concern is Oglethorpe," Coach Tucker said. "(Oglethorpe) is going to sit back and let us shoot it. If we make them we win. If we don't, it'll be close."

Despite their recent slide, Union County (15-8, 4-2) was able score a decisive win at Greene

Entering the contest, Union had lost five of six and were on the verge of dropping to fourth in Region 8-AA after a gut wrenching home loss to Jefferson on Wednesday.

Union traveled to Jefferson again on Friday and slipped up against the Lady Dragons one more time, but the second contest didn't count toward the 8-AA

Finally the Lady Panthers were able to bounce back with a 12-point win down south in Greensboro to keep them in a favorable bracket entering the Region Tournament.

Lady Panthers 31

The Lady Panthers were unable to finish off the Jefferson Lady Dragons in a battle for second place last Wednesday night in Blairsville. It was a low scoring affair

throughout but Union was able to mount a 10-point lead midway through the third quarter at 23-13 but the Lady Dragons mounted a 9-0 run to close the frame, then outscored Union 12-8 in the fourth for a 34-31 Jefferson victory.

Brooke Maddox led the Lady Panthers with 12 points but foul trouble again took its toll on Union's leading scorer. The junior guard picked up foul number three with 2:28 to play in the first half,

and her fourth with 4:24 left in nailed a 15-footer then a trey, the game. She eventually picked up her fifth with 50 seconds re
putting Union back up three with 5:30 to go. maining.

The Lady Panthers held an 18-13 lead at the break thanks to a 10-5 second quarter. Maddox picked a Lady Dragon ball handler and knocked down a short jumper, with just under 6 minutes to play in the third. She went on to knock down two from the line at the 5:33 mark and with 3:42 to play in the third, junior Lisa Nalaschi went 1-for-2 at the line, giving the Lady Panthers a 23-13 advantage.

Jefferson answered with a trey, a pair of deuces, and two free throws to close the quarter and get within a point of Union.

Just 19 seconds into the fourth, Maddox hit another pair from the line but the Lady Dragons responded with a trey to tie things

Jefferson fired back with a trey of their own to even it back up at 30-30. A pair from the charity stripe with 4:18 left gave the visitors their first lead since early in the second quarter. Maddox trimmed the lead in half with a 1-for-2 visit to the line with 3:46

Trailing 32-31, the Lady Panthers had several chances to regain the lead, but the shots didn't fall. Jefferson eventually added two free throws with 50 seconds left for a 34-31 advantage.

Panthers 60 Riverside 45




Despite never leading during the contest, Union kept the Dragons in sight but were never able to sustain any offense, derailing any comeback hopes.
