## Fire destroys home as snow arrives By Charles Duncan North Georgia News

editor@nganews.com Union County firefighters responded to a structure

fire on Woods Road just as the predicted snowstorm arrived on Feb. 10. Union County Fire Chief/EMA Director Charles Worden said the 4,050 square-

foot home was fully engulfed

in flames as firefighters arrived on the scene. "The structure was falling into the basement as command was being established," Chief Worden said. "Stations 1 and 2 and all available tankers received a call from E-911

"The home was fully involved at the time of the call," Chief Worden said.

Inclement weather posed a problem gaining access due to a steep driveway at the home, Chief Worden said.

"Engine 1 and Tanker

gain access through an old road leading to the rear of the home," Chief Worden said. "An evaluation by Lt. Damon Hood revealed that the home had completely burned down into the basement area."

Chief Worden said that firefighters used three hoses from Engine 1 to extinguish the remaining blaze.

"Firefighters used approximately 7,000 gallons of water to put out the hot spots," Chief Worden said. They also used 15 gallons of foam solution to put a layer of foam over the remains of the home to prevent it from rekin-

second home for the homeowner. No one was at the residence at the time of the fire. Chief Worden said.

"The snow was falling at the time of the call and it didn't make for the most ideal firefighting situation," Chief Worden said. "We did what we could do given the circum-

No one was reported injured during the blaze, Chief Worden said.

"A home fire is always a tragic situation," Chief Worden said. "We're always proud when we can report that there were no injuries."
