Amber Seeba now a Georgia Highlands Charger

Union County Lady Panther third baseman Amber Seeba has selected Georgia Highlands College as the next stop of her softball career.

Seeba, the daughter of Kimberly Smith, played softball for four years at Union County where she won two Region 8-AA titles and played for a third.

During her senior campaign, Seeba secured the hot corner for the Lady Panthers where her glove and arm proved vital to the success of Union County. One of her most memorable moments was turning a triple play last summer on her traveling team. Seeba led the Lady Panthers in assists, throwing out 83 runners

Not only was Seeba a defensive anchor for the Lady Panther infield, she proved she could handle herself at the plate. Thirteen walks was good for

Seeba will be around some familiar faces when softball season rolls around. Jefferson's Morgan McKinney and Lindsey Miles will join Seeba as a GHC Charger. McKinney was named the 8-AA Pitcher of the Year in 2012. Others from Seeba's State Tournament past headed to GHC are Buford's Jazmin Hawkins, and Rockmart's Brandi Hughes

While continuing their education, Seeba and her fellow North Georgians will be looking to lay a solid foundation for the future of GHC softball.

"I plan on accomplishing many things," Seeba said. "I want to become a better student and improve in softball. After two years at Georgia Highlands I want to transfer into a bigger school and hopefully get the opportunity to continue to play while working towards getting an engineering degree."



Last week we took a look

at ball flight and what causes certain swings to hit it high or low. The basic cause of high and low shots is the arc of the swing but that is not the only determining factor for individual ball flight. Skilled players can have a steep arc and still hit it low and vice versa but normally the swing arc is the main determining factor.

A common known aspect which will affect ball flight is ball position at address. It is true that if you move the ball back of center in your address position it can cause you to hit it lower than you normally do, but did you know that moving the ball back also adds spin and takes away distance? It will!

Moving the ball back at address is a good way to adjust ball flight but it changes your swing dramatically. It requires practice to become accustomed to a new impact point which is very difficult to do without adding hand action. Improper hand action can destroy a good shot and cause all types of other problems. It is vital that you limit hand action to a minimum and allow the arms to rotate through impact. Arm rotation squares the club face correctly where as hand action adds inconsistency through impact.

Being able to adjust your ball flight is something that can enhance your game and get you out of some bad situations. Ever need to hit a shot out from under a tree to get back in play? Have vou ever hit a normal shot into the wind and watch the ball rise and fall as it hits an invisible wall of air? Both of these situations require a low ball flight so let's look at the so called "knock-down" shot which is what moving the ball back in your stance creates.

Remember that to adjust normal ball flight height you need only to change the position of the front shoulder on the back swing; down under the chin more for a steeper arc and higher ball flight and higher in the backswing for a lower ball flight.

The knock-down shot is not a normal shot; it is a manipulated movement of the normal course!

Try and maintain the hands ahead position throughout the downswing and on through impact. This will smother the ball and keep it low and also limit the amount of spin created by moving the ball back in your stance. If the hands break down and the club head gets in the lead on the downswing, there will be way to much spin on the ball due to the hitting effort of the hands. You will create more spin on the ball by moving it back in your stance

swing. To hit a knock-down shot,

duces the extra spin effect. Second, don't shift the weight to the back leg as much as you would on a normal swing but try instead to keep some weight on the front foot during the whole swing. This will promote a more active shoulder turn to build the needed energy it takes to accelerate through impact. Make sure you hit the ball first and don't allow the club to get into the ground before the clubface strikes the ball.

Many of you have seen Tiger Woods hit what he calls "the stinger" off the tee in many different situations and this is the same as a knock-down shot only with a wood or long iron. The advantage you get is not only a lower flight but this shot promotes deadly accuracy. It' okay to give up yardage for accuracy in many cases and that is his philosophy when using this shot. I have heard many good players say they feel like they are smothering the ball when they are hitting it well.

The knock-down shot is a very important shot to have and can be mastered with a little practice. It can even be used in chipping if you are trying to run the ball a long distance to a back pin on a deep green. It is crucial that you learn this shot before you try and apply it to a handicap qualifying round so practice this technique and watch the ball flight start low and stay low.

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

Zollinger finished with 10 but Rabun finished with 18. points, 5 rebounds, and 4 assists.

Nalaschi finished with 6 points and 5 boards, Brown had 6 points and 2 blocks. Arnold had 2 points, 8 boards, and 4 assists. Meanwhile Maddox and Adams scored 2 each.

Union County is still tied for first in 8-AA and can snatch the No. 1 seed with a Rabun win over Greene on Thursday, followed by a Union win at Washington-Wilkes on Saturday.




