worked very hard to prepare for the survey. The dispatch center, which makes up 10% of the survey, was evaluated for equipment, personnel, and training. The water departments, which make up 40% of the survey, were evaluated for hydrants, water pipes, supply and usage. The fire department, which makes up 50% of the survey, was evaluated on apparatus, equipment, training, station placement, response, and personnel on scene of

structure fires.

2. Treat your seeds. Seeds treated with insecticides can keep SCA at bay for up to 40 days after planting.

3. Get out in the field. Scouting is the number one way to prevent major damage by insects, and SCA is no exception. Damaged leaves are often yellowish and covered in honeydew produced by the aphids, giving them a shiny ap-

research group. (This does not necessarily mean they won't owe their home states income tax.)

Roughly half pay no federal income tax because they have no taxable income and the other roughly half get enough tax breaks to erase their tax liability, explains Roberton Williams, a Senior Fellow at the Tax Policy Center.

The top 1% of taxpayers pay a higher effective income tax rate than any other group (around 23 percent, according to a report released by the Tax Policy Center in 2014) nearly seven times higher than those in the bottom 50%.

On average, those in the bottom 40% of the income spectrum end up getting money from the government. Meanwhile, the richest 20% of Americans, by far, pay the most in income taxes, forking over nearly 87 percent of all the income tax collected by the

area roadsides clean and natural looking. Of course, this starts with never littering ourselves (I hasten to add that most readers would never litter) and doing all possible to encouraging others to behave accordingly. For example, when you have construction workers or service persons driving a pickup or open truck doing a job for you, pay attention to whether there is any packaging or loose material used on the job. If there is, offer the worker a bag and ask him to bag the material and put it inside the cab so that it will not blow off. Much of the trash that I personally pick up originates in fast food outlets. Let's join together and think of creative ways to get the franchisees to help us lessen this source of litter. We cannot reasonably expect to eliminate takeouts altogether or require buyers to post bond, but perhaps if we asked the managers of these outlets to help, they will think of good ideas such as adopting a section of highway and regularly picking up the litter. As time permits I plan to contact the national headquarters of local franchises, apprise them of this problem and ask for their cooperation and assistance. I also plan to contact local commercial trash haulers because I know for a fact that much roadside litter is blowing off their trucks. Has your church or civic organization adopted a highway yet? Maybe you will encourage them to do so. Let me remind you of an ancient proverb paraphrased here as, "It is better to light one small candle than to curse the darkness." Every time that you stoop to pick up someone else's trash you are lighting a small candle and we are making a difference. Thank you for caring so much!

sorghum, which is used for making the syrup we all know and love. However, there are effective treatments available for feed and silage sorghum, such as Sivanto. The threshold for treatment is when 50 or more aphids are found on 25 percent of the crop. Treating for SCA at the boot stage (seed head is developing inside of the stem and has not yet emerged) and the preboot stage (the growth stage before the seed head is present) will help to prevent devastating damage to forage and silage sorghum. It is important never to use pyrethroid insecticides to control SCA, because these will kill any beneficial insects that are potentially keeping the aphids in check while having little effect on aphids themselves, allowing the pests to flourish and damage your
