
after the full Senate votes on the budget.

Sen. Gooch, who represents Union County in Senate District 51, said he'll fight "tooth and nail" to prevent any cuts to the Sparsity Grants that play such an important role in funding for Woody Gap School.

"It's about \$246,000," Sen. Gooch said. "It would have a negative impact on Woody Gap School if the cut becomes a reality. I'm doing my best to make sure that doesn't happen.'

Woody Gap School first began to receive Sparsity Grant funding in 1974, when it was designated as an Isolated School by state lawmakers. The reasoning behind the Sparsity Grant funding: due to its location of approximately 3,000 feet above sea level and being accessible only by way of hazardous, curvy mountain roads, Woody Gap School qualified for those funds.

The school provides classes from Pre-K through 12. In 1981 the school realized Standard School status and has been accredited by the Southern Association of Col-

leges since 1988.

Also, most recently, the state Board of Education determined that a merger of Union County and Woody Gap School is not feasible because consolidation of the two schools would result in a por-

tion of students whose travel time would exceed the state's prescribed criteria concerning travel time to and from school.

Union County School Board Chairman Gary Davenport said Woody Gap School

remains an important part of the Union County School System. "In my opinion, Woody Gap has been kept on the back burner for too long," Davenport said. "This board will do what it needs to do to keep Woody Gap School going.'

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"Emma is the first individual female state champion to hail from Union County and it was great experience to be able to welcome her and her family to the State Capitol," State Rep. Allison said.

Garrison didn't just win the state title, she torched the state course in Carrollton, outdistancing more than 190 runners for a first place finish.

She clocked in at just under 20 minutes. In what had been an all boys club for nearly 40 years in Union County, Garrison joins Larry Turner, Jaime Gibson, and Chris Jones as a state champion. Garrison is the only female State Champion in the history of Union County Schools.

Garrison's achievement marks the seventh state championship in school history thanks to her time of 19:56 - 14 seconds ahead of Wesleyan's Caroline Reed.

"It feels really good," Garrison said. "I'm so happy right now. I just wanted to do my best and I am really surprised that I got First Place."

The freshman phenom broke away early and held a 10-second lead over the 2011 Class AA State Champion and odds-on-favorite, Sahara Fletcher of Westminster.

Garrison stretched her lead to 20 seconds over Fletcher, before the Westmin-

ster senior dropped out of the race.

Coming down the home stretch, Garrison maintained her 15-20 second lead, and a roar could be heard from the Union County faithful as their young star topped the final hill and crossed the finish line in first place.

State Rep. Allison, along with Sen. Gooch, took the time to document the historic achievement last week at the State Capitol and thanked Garrison for taking the time to visit them in Atlanta.

"It is an honor to be able to represent such a great community in Atlanta," State Rep. Allison said.
