Union avoided dropping the second consecutive contest to the Lady Indians but were unable to get the win.


Towns County got on the board early and the 1-0 score held for the remainder of the

The month of March has been a roller coaster ride for Union County baseball, and the crucible of region play just around the corner for the Panthers and Head Coach Brandon Bradburn.

The Panthers (7-3, 1-2) were flying high following senior Lane Everett's flawless victory over Oglethorpe and the momentum carried over into last Monday's contest with Towns County.

The Panthers hosted the rival Indians and sent them home after four innings in a 16-1 shellacking. Towns got on the board in the top half of the first but wouldn't score again, and it was all Union from then on The Panthers built an 8-1 lead after one, added two in the second, three in the third, and three more in the fourth to wrap it up via mercy rule.

Despite the postseason approximately six weeks out, playoff implications were already on the line when Rabun County rolled into town on Tuesday and took a 4-2 win over the surging Panthers. However, the Wildcats made a statement right out of the gates by getting a run off Everett in the first inning and two more in the second. Meanwhile, Rabun junior Stenson Scott baffled the Union lineup, taking a one-hit shutout into the seventh inning before the Panthers tacked on two.

On Wednesday, Union paid a visit to Hiawassee to take on the Indians for the second time in three days and this time, Towns County threw everything but the kitchen sink at the Panthers.

Leading 5-0, Union surrendered three runs in the fifth, and one in the sixth but were able to hold off their archrival for a 6-4 win and remain unbeaten on
