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April is Parkinson's Awareness Month


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No one knows Parkinson's Disease better than Suches' Chuck Esposito.

The new road will aid considerably in the Downtown Development Authority's efforts to develop the 6.4-acre Haralson property behind City Hall, Mayor Conley said.

Once the project is put out for bid, the process lasts 30 days, Mayor Conley said.

"We hope to be in the construction phase no later than the first of July," Mayor Conley said.

The existing off ramp will continue to be used until the road is built, with the new road coming into the city opposite Young Harris Street, Mayor Conley said.

The existing off ramp, once closed, will be given to the city to be used for parking, Mayor Conley said.

Since 1966, Blairsville and Union County have benefitted from investments by the Appalachian Regional Com-

Blairsville water line extension, Union County Cannery Building, and work on the Byron Herbert Reece Farm and Heritage Center are just a few of the projects the ARC has had a direct hand in bringing to the community in the past few years.

The ARC was established by Congress in 1965 as a regional economic development agency that represents a partnership of federal, state, and local governments. Each year ARC provides

funding for several hundred projects in the Appalachian Region, in areas such as business development, education and job training, telecommunications, infrastructure, community development, housing, and transportation.

The agency's 420county territory includes 25 million residents and pieces of 12 states stretching from New York to Mississippi.

That funding includes nearly \$6 million in the past five years, said Heather Feldman, Georgia Mountain Regional Commission's economic development director.

She cited other numbers, including 1,089 jobs created and another 47.9 million See ARC, Page 2A
