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prayer for our military, I just want to say that in 1973, Ted Barnes and myself were the last two draftees to leave Union County. The Vietnam War was going on and a lot of soldiers were coming home in boxes or were missing in action," Sheriff Mason said. "Had they been allowed to come back home, what would their lives have prospered into. The war was unfolding on TV every time you turned it on, and you had Vietnam in our living rooms. This country needs to not forget the sacrifices that have been made. Freedom is not free."

Mason then quoted a song titled, Land of the

Free.

"Land of the free, sweet home of liberty, but it came at such a great cost. Our soldiers, brave and true, gave their lives for me and you. Thank God for the red, white, and blue. Over the sea, on an old rugged tree, a battle was won long ago. We'll not be falling in, we have victory over sin. Thank God for Mount Calvary."

Prayer of repentance and reading of II Chronicles 7:14 was from World Harvest North Church Pastor

with Union County Schools Superintendent Gary Steppe regarding the formation of a new R.O.T.C. program at Union County High School.
"That would be a plus

for Union County," Major Gen. Akin said. "I interviewed Leon because I wanted to get a letter from him to be part of the package that will be going into getting an application for an R.O.T.C. detachment here in Union County.

Major Gen. Akin continued by giving a summary of Davenport's distinguished military career that included three Silver Stars for performing heroic deeds during combat. Not only did Davenport receive three Silver Stars, he received two Bronze Stars and a Purple Heart. He earned 10 Air Medals for his significant number of hours in the air during the operations while he was in the ser-

"I could go through all of the different awards where he was recognized during all of his tours overseas, so Leon, we are proud of you and proud that you are a part of Union County," Major Gen. Akin said. "We want to do this for you, we love you buddy, and thank you very much.

Davenport graduated from Union County High School in 1945, but had already joined the U.S. Army and went on active duty before coming back to Blairsville in full military uniform to receive his high school diploma.

Davenport served in Japan during the end of World War II, where he stayed with the occupation forces until a conflict broke out on the neighboring Korean peninsula in June of 1950.

There, he served with the famed 24th Infantry Division during the conflict that has never officially ended, only halted by a cease fire being agreed upon by all sides in July 1953.

Davenport was given a Battlefield Commission during the Korean Conflict, which after the Vietnam War, these appointments became nearly non existent due to stricter U.S. Army regulations.
"The bottom line is,

he had one tour during the (Korean) War, and when he came home to Fort Benning, he had a friend who had a family and the idea of getting sent to Korea scared him to death and he didn't want to go," Akin said. "So Leon volunteered to take his place and go back to Korea.'

From 1955 to 1962, Davenport served in the Army Reserves until he decided to return to active duty in 1962 during the Berlin cri-

In 1961, the Soviet Union began construction of the Berlin Wall, separating East and West Berlin. When Davenport arrived, the Soviets were in the process of turning the Berlin Wall from a wire fence to the actual concrete wall that stood until 1990.

Davenport remained in West Germany until 1972, when he was sent back to Southeast Asia as an advisor

during the Vietnam War. When Davenport decided to return stateside for good, he didn't kick back and enjoy retirement, although it

"After all of his years of deployment for our country, he came home to provide the same dedication to our county," Paris said. "He became the administrator at Union General Hospital and made it one of the best and most recognized small, rural hospitals in the United
