Union County Commissioner Lamar Paris says no one individual, entity or agency is to blame for the March 4th communications blackout that wiped out landlines, Internet, cable TV and cell phone service for residents in two counties for almost two hours. An overloaded telecom-

munications fuse and faulty power inverter proved to be the culprits of the communications outage that left emergency workers and residents in Union and Towns counties without any means of communication other than talking out loud. The E-911 centers in

Union County High School has now sent someone to each of the three Military Academies.

Union County senior T Bentley has made his decision and it is the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Bentley received nomi-

nations for West Point, the Naval Academy, and the Air Force. With the deadline for West Point being Friday, Apr. 12th, Bentley chose the Air Force early last week.

"Both the Air Force Academy and West Point gave me dates in which I had to let them know if I would be accepting the Appointment," Bentley said. "I had to let West Point know by the 12th and the deadline for the Air Force Academy was the 30th of April. The first person

I called to let them know my decision was the sprint football coach at West Point on April 2. I informed him that I appreciate all of the support he has given me through this.' With graduation on the horizon, Bentley will have about a month to enjoy his summer break then it's off to Colorado on June 27 for a sixweek basic training session before school actually starts.

"The first day is called 'I-day' for In-processing," Bentley said. "The first four weeks consist of military training on the grounds of the Air Force Academy. The next two weeks consist of training in the wilderness. What do I expect? All the information I receive says to 'expect the unexpected!' After these six weeks, the school years begins. The first year will be quite a challenge for myself mentally, physically, and emotionally. My goal for this first year is to lay a solid ground work for myself on which to build the next three years." Although, Bentley loves taking to the skies, he would be happy to fly any type of airplane, but his goal is to someday fly fighter jets. "Even though there are just under 1,000 cadets at the AFA in a given year, only a select group of these earn the right

Mason: Payne committed suicide

Union County Sheriff Mack Mason says that the Georgia Bureau of Investigation is reporting that the 34-year-old man who killed his father and stepmother on Nottely Dam Road, turned a gun on himself when encountered by Cherokee County, GA sheriff's deputies on Swan Lane in Canton in the early morning hours of April 5th. GBI reports indicate that

a Cherokee County sheriff's deputy struck Anthony Payne in the arm during a standoff with the double-homicide suspect, Sheriff Mason said. All indications point

to Payne turning the gun he wouldn't put down on himself, the sheriff said. "That's what we're

learning from the GBI," Sheriff Mason said. "We don't know if it was intentional, or if it was a reflex. We do know that he inflicted the fatal gunshot on himself."

Payne, of Canton, formerly of Blairsville, originally was believed shot and killed by law enforcement following a confrontation with Cherokee County, GA authorities, Sheriff Mason said. Anthony Payne was the



lone person of interest in the

April 2nd shooting deaths of his father, Charlie Payne, 59, and his stepmother Louise Payne, 67. The couple's bodies

were discovered April 4th by family members at their home at 1098 Nottely Dam Road, Sheriff Mason said. The case involving An-

thony Payne began to unfold on April 4th as family members discovered the bodies of Charlie and Louise Payne inside their home, Sheriff Mason said. "Their

vehicle was missing, it was a 2007 Ford F-150 pickup, grey in color,' Sheriff Mason said.

A witness saw Anthony Payne speeding out of Not-

tely Dam Road on Tuesday afternoon, April 2nd in that vehicle, which lead authorities to make him their prime person of interest in the case, the

We entered that truck on the GCIC as missing/stolen," Sheriff Mason said. "That truck was located in Cherokee County, GA. Mr. Anthony Payne was not with that truck at the time that it was located by Cherokee County.

"Information from the persons in that truck led Cherokee County authorities to Swan Lane in Canton," Sheriff Mason said. "At approximately 1:30 a.m., Cherokee County deputies encountered Anthony Payne, he brandished a weapon, deputies urged him to drop his weapon, shots were fired.

"Anthony Payne was pronounced dead at the scene in Canton," Sheriff Mason said. "We had not secured murder warrants for Anthony Payne at the time of his death. We simply had a lookout for his father's stolen F-150." The sheriff said that two

weapons were secured at the Swan Lane location in Canton. One weapon, the gun Anthony Payne used to kill himself. The second, a weapon believed used to kill Charlie and Louise Payne, Sheriff Mason said.

began in 2007 when he contracted to build a home for Pete Langlotz, Lt. Derflinger "The builder was paid

to build the house," Lt. Derflinger said. "The builder failed to pay sub-contractors and supply houses resulting in \$99,000 worth of liens being placed on the home. See Builder, Page 3A
