But this year's Region Championship coronation - a a game with an overmatched Washington-Wilkes squad - was delayed by nearly two hours due to the Tigers' bus getting stopped behind a fallen telephone pole that shut down Hwy. 76 in eastern Towns County on Friday

When the game finally got underway, the Lady Panthers needed less than 33 minutes to score 10 goals and end the game via mercy-stoppage to secure consecutive Region 8-AA titles on Senior Night in Blairsville. Senior Rachel Vester stole


the show during her final Region home game - scoring four goals, including three during a span of 98 seconds to stretch the lead from 3-0 to 6-0. Vester would later add an assist to make it a 9-0 game. Junior Braedyn Robbins

Freshman Madison Yost, who finished with three goals, scored an unassisted goal in the seventh minute before the Lady Panthers (9-1, 4-0) went on a 10-minute mini-drought that ended with Vester's three-goal barrage in the 17th and 18th minutes.

Yost assisted Vester with 23 minutes left in the first half before senior Ansley Garrison fed Vester for another goal just 26 seconds later. Garrison finished with three



Panthers conclude roller coaster week with Region title

Union entered this week on the verge of back-to-back region titles, but following consecutive losses to open the week, first place wasn't determined until the final out of the second game at Social Circle on Friday, when the Panthers won via tiebreaker.

With its back against the wall in game two at Social Circle, Union (13-7, 9-3) came out swinging and took a 5-0 advantage in the second inning. The Redskins got two runs

back in the bottom of the third but the Panthers added three more in the fourth and five in the fifth for a 13-3 victory in five innings. Union receives the No. 1

seed in the Class AA State Playoffs after outscoring Social Circle 15-6 in their two games - which was the first tiebreaker. On Tuesday, Union allowed only two hits at Rabun, but

Senior Andrew Brown also drove in four runs, thanks in large part to a 3-run double in the second inning to spot the Panthers a five-run lead.

Sophomores Patrick Baggett and Crawford Colwell also had a big game at the plate with Baggett going 2-for-3 with 2 RBIs, 4 runs, and a walk.

Colwell was 2-for-3 with 3 runs, a walk, and a stolen base.

On the mound, senior Lance Rich recorded his fourth win (4-2) of the year, and more importantly, pitched Union County to its second region title in as many years

Rich got the first out on a swing and miss at strike three, then a ground out to third brought in a run. Trailing 3-2 in the seventh, Brown reached on an error and advanced to second on an errant pick off attempt.

Rich walked to put the goahead run on first with two outs but Smith ended the game with his second strikeout of the inning and fifth of the game.

Baggett and Brown opened the game with consecutive base hits at Rabun then scored on RBI singles from Rich and Banton for a 2-0 lead.

Mancuso issued five walks in the third inning but a double play limited the Wildcats to just

one run in the inning.

The Panthers quickly answered with doubles by Cole Davis and Brown to extend the advantage back to two runs at 3-1 in the fourth. Rabun responded with

its only two hits of the day and manufactured a run by way of a stolen base and a ground out. After Mancuso got the

second out via strikeout, he issued a pair of walks - one intentional then hit a batter.

Tied at 3-3 an error brought in two Wildcat runs before Mancuso hit his second batter of the

inning. Junior Josh Nachtrieb got the call from the bullpen and issued a walk to make it a 6-3 Rabun lead. A passed ball made it 7-3 but Nachtrieb settled down and didn't allow a hit over the

final 2 1/3 innings, keeping Union

in the game. In the sixth, the Panthers

hit into a double play but still managed to put two aboard but couldn't cut into the deficit. Union loaded the bases

with one out in the seventh and following a strikeout for the second out, King was hit-by-apitch to make it a 7-4 game, but once again, the Panthers couldn't deliver a clutch hit.

Union traveled to Murphy, NC on Monday. Then Andrews, NC will host the Panthers on Thursday. Why the No. 1 seed is so

important in the State Tourney: With Region 8-AA drawing Region 5 in the first round, the top spot in next week's State Tournament will face No. 4 seed

And there is a huge gap between the top three teams and the rest of Region 5-AA.

While 23-0 Bowdon is one of the best in the State, 5-AA's No. 2 team Heard County and 5-AA's No. 3 team Bremen, both sport double-digit win totals. Meanwhile, No. 4 Manchester is currently 6-15 overall.

No. 2 Heard and No. 4 Manchester met three times with Heard outscoring Manchester by a combined score of 28-9.

By drilling Social Circle 13-3, the Panthers have definitely put themselves in the best possible scenario to advance.

The Georgia High School Association has Apr. 29 listed as the start date for the Class AA State Tournament with Apr. 30 serving as the date for any third games - if necessary.
