yellow hairs. Bumble bees are also somewhat social, but they do not burrow into wood to create their communities. They prefer soil. Bumble bees construct nests underground and, unlike the carpenter bees, usually have a single queen whose main purpose is to reproduce and is cared for by other members of the community. Their hives are typically anywhere from 50 to 400 individual bees, which is far smaller than their cosmopolitan honeybee cousins who form hives of around 50,000 or more.

Carpenter bees are tricky to get rid of. They are highly effective burrowers, so even if you treat one hole, they can easily make another. One effective way to combat these pests is to treat their burrows in the evening or at night by spraying a bee and wasp aerosol insecticide into their burrows. While male carpenter bees cannot sting, the females can sting if provoked so exercise caution when treating burrows. Do not repair the carpenter bee damage until the bee has had a chance to exit the hole and come into contact with the insecticide

Typically, one treatment in spring and one in summer will greatly reduce carpenter bee numbers, and once the population is culled, you can repair the damage using wood putty or dowels.

To prevent future damage, paint or varnish outdoor wooden surfaces. Carpenter bees are less likely to chew through this treated wood to create burrows. However, these bees have no problem chewing through wood that has only been stained.

helicopter membership Application?

A. You can pick up a copy at the Union County Library and at the main office of Union General Hospital when you first walk in the lobby area. You can also turn your form in at the Library or at the Hospital. There will also be blank forms available at the County Commissioner's office.

Q. How long is this medical helicopter membership coverage good for?

A. The coverage will run from June of 2016 to May of 2017

Between now and then, Union General Hospital will evaluate the cost and see if the membership service is feasible to continue the coverage for an additional year.

O. Will all Union County citizens be given free membership in the emergency helicopter service?

A. Yes, but you and your family must be signed up by May 15th to be covered and you must live in Union County.

Q. Why is the county and hospital offering this membership free to the pub-

A. We both want to do something for the citizens that will be a significant benefit for everyone.

The first year of operation the helicopter service is working with Union General Hospital to not only promote the hospital but to promote the professionalism and advantage of the new helicopter service.

Q. What does this membership cover?

A. Hopefully it will never happen, but if you or a family member should be injured or become sick requiring an emergency helicopter ride for emergency life saving needs, this membership will assure that you will not receive any bill or supplement bill for the cost of the transport.

Q. If we have purchased similar membership with another helicopter company, would we cancel that?

A. Generally not. There will now be two

helicopter services available in our mountain area.

The one stationed in Blue Ridge, Erlanger/Life Force may have their own separate membership.

Q. Why would we ever need to use a different helicopter service other than the one stationed at Union General Hospital?

A. Normally, you probably would not need a second service.

However, if the UGH helicopter is en route on an emergency and another emergency requiring transport is needed at the same time, the helicopter in Blue Ridge would be called.

Also, if the weather were to be bad in one area, or if there were mechanical problems, a different helicopter might be

able to cover the emergency. So it is a great benefit to the citizens of the general mountain area to have two options available.

However, for the vast majority of times, the UGH helicopter will be available for service.

A. Each year, many emergency flights are flown out of Union General to other area trauma centers.

The likelihood of any one person or family needing this service is minimal, but if needed, the financial impact could be significant.

Since it is free to the public, there is no reason not to join.

for tobacco, alcohol, or drugs and inconsistent enforcement for breaking those rules; belief that there is little risk in using a drug

Protective Factors: Protective factors are those characteristics that can reduce a person's risk for substance abuse or addiction. Protective factors that may decrease the risk of drug use include: strong bond with a parent or caregiver; high self esteem; parent or caregiver who talks regularly with their child about drugs; active in faith-based organizations, school, athletic, or community activities; spending time around positive role models; living in a community that offers youths activities where drugs and alcohol are not tolerated; attending a school with an effective alcohol and drug education program and a non-tolerance policy for alcohol and drugs; belief that using drugs may be harmful or risky.

As a parent you can control many of the risk and protective factors in your home. Remember that parents and caregivers are the most important role models in children's lives. Parents and caregivers have the opportunity to guide their teen in making positive decisions about drug and alcohol use. Talk to your kids about drugs.
