wishing to get their pets vaccinated, but who may not have had the budget for an extra \$40 to \$45 exam fee at the vet's office.

"We're giving one-year rabies vaccinations, unless they're already in our system," said David Bell, head technician at Union County Pet Hospital. "They can get the three-year rabies only if they've had the one-year rabies, and only if they're in our system.

"Some are getting distemper hepatitis and parvovirus vaccinations, or they can have the distemper hepatitis leptospirosis. If the owners opt for more, they're getting combination vaccines, but most of them just do rabies vaccinations."

As in previous years, Dr. Barnes enlisted the help of the Union County Rotarians with coordinating and assisting with this event, along with her personal staff. Rotary and Interact volunteers moved from car to car and back again, assisting the completion of patient forms, keying pet information into the computer and handling payments for the vaccines.

"As cars start coming in, they get forms to fill out to get specifics so that they go in a computer for next year, that way we can track animal population and the health of the individual animals," said Rotary volunteer Edward Sternberg. "As the cars move up the line, they're assigned a number and we collect the money for the shots.

"They pull up to me, I stamp it paid, enter it into the computer, and as they move up into the line one of the vets will lean into the car and do the inoculations. Last year we gave around a thousand vaccinations, so who knows how many we'll have this year."

Dr. Barnes explained that she and her staff are ever grateful for the help and involvement of the Rotarians with the event. With their help, Union County Pet Hospital estimated they were once more able to deliver around a thousand vaccinations this year, which doesn't include the vaccinations administered by Blairsville Animal Hospital at other locations in the

"The reminder is that this is a project where we do rabies vaccinations for pets and human health, because 99 percent of human rabies cases are from dog bites," said Dr. Barnes. "That's how these rabies clinics started across the country. Everybody here has obviously seen the effect of healthier pets, but it also means healthier humans. That's our goal, to have a win, win, win for everybody.'
