Lady Panthers' playoff run ends in Elite 8 at the hands of Lovett

Union County ladies arguably the No. 1 public school in Class AA

Despite losing the services of its leading scorer Maddy Morlock in the Region Championshipclinching game, Union County (10-2) made an historic playoff run - reaching the Elite 8 for the first time in the program's history before falling 5-0 to Lovett, the No. 3 team in the State.

After thrashing Darlington, the Lady Panthers poured it on during a 6-0 rout of Thomasville, who made the 350-mile trek to Blairsville where the majority of the Lady Bulldogs were looking at mountains for the very first time.

But the guests from South Georgia would be in for a rude awakening, thanks in large part to Union's underclassmen.

Just 70 seconds into the contest, sophomore Joanna Irvin put the home team on the board with a goal off an assist from fellow sophomore Braedyn Rob-Two minutes and 21 sec-

only senior goal of the evening. Following the intermission, junior Rachel Vester stretched the Lady Panthers' lead to 4-0 thanks to assists from freshmen Innis and

Layne Baenninger. The next score came in the game's 66th minute when Carter fed Robbins for a goal. Union's sixth and final goal came with under 9 minutes to play, and would also belong to Robbins, with Baenninger receiving credit

The win improved the Lady Panthers to 10-1 and punched their ticket to the Elite 8 of the Class AA State Tournament - marking the program's first trip beyond the final 16.

Unfortunately for Union County, standing between them and a berth in the Final Four was the 3rd ranked Lovett Lady Lions, the No. 2 seed from a Region that consists of the top four teams in Georgia - the private school powerhouses of GAC, Wesleyan, Lovett, and Holy Innocents.

In Friday night's meeting between the Lady Panthers and the Lady Lions, the Union County

Lady Panthers' keeper Joanna Van Pelt played her heart out. The Union County senior kept the Lady Lions from pulling away in the early going with several difficult stops, including one off the foot of an outstretched left leg when it appeared Lovett was on the verge of taking control

"Joanna is a gamer," Coach Hunter said. "She's one of those players that, the bigger the game, the more she's looking to step up and get after it.

Hunter must replace seven seniors that have been vital to the Union County soccer program.

"We'll be very young next vear because we will have lost As for Model, the Blue players that we've built the team around for the last four years,"

One of the reasons that Hunter feels they will be successful, is the camaraderie and the family atmosphere surrounding both Union County soccer teams.

"Our two teams play hard together, look out for each other, and are a unit," he said. "That's why we had the success this year. We had talent but we also had everyone pulling in the same direction."

Panthers take Game One in extra innings but unable to close out Fitzgerald

Fitzgerald - The Panthers were one game away from a trip to the Elite 8 after taking Game One from 8th ranked Fitzgerald in the second round of the Class AA State Baseball Tournament.

After fighting off a tenacious Model squad in the first round, the Panthers found themselves on the road to South Georgia where they would meet the Purple Hurricanes of Fitzgerald - the Region 1-AA Champions.

Union stole game one 7-6 in eight innings but dropped the second game 8-3 and the third

In the first meeting it was obvious that neither squad brought its A-game but the Panthers were able to prevail without a single extra base hit, while committing 5 errors in the field.

On the mound for Union was Joseph Mancuso, but the junior ace was anything but sharp - issuing 7 walks and hitting three batters.

Struggling in all three phases of the game is usually a recipe for disaster but Panthers Head Coach Brandon Bradburn is proud of the way his team fought to the very end and came through in the clutch during the late innings.

'In that first game, neither team really played great," he said. "Joe (Mancuso) kept us going on the mound and just kept working hard out there for us.

"Offensively the whole series was very difficult due to the quality of their pitchers. I feel the reason we came out with a win was the defensive effort late in the game. In the bottom of the eighth, they hit the ball very well but we finally came through with some spectacular defense at the right time.'

Leading 5-4 entering the top of the seventh, the Panthers added an insurance run when junior Lance Rich reached on

Fitzgerald came to the plate first and took a 1-0 lead on Hughes, who stayed on the mound for the second contest.

But the Panthers would answer right back with two runs in the bottom half of the first, beginning with a double from Daniel and a bunt single from Hughes. Daniel would steal home and Hughes scored on

Two runs in the third and two more in the fourth provided the Purple Hurricanes some breathing room with a 5-2 ad-

Neither team was able to mount any offense until the top of the seventh when Fitzgerald struck for three more runs.

Trailing 8-2, Union got a run back in its final at bat when Mancuso singled, Jackson Burks reached on a dropped third strike, Rich drew a walk, and Tyler Odom scored Mancuso on a

Daniel got the call in game three and despite walking five and hitting two batters, kept the Panthers in the game.

"The dixie cup sized strike zone our pitchers had to work with was frustrating, but we still found ways to keep us in the games," Coach Bradburn said.

The Fitzgerald pitching staff limited Union to just one extra base hit in Game Three making the Panthers earn their runs, base-by-base.

The Purple Hurricanes built a 4-1 lead in Game Three but the Panthers got two runs in the fifth to get within a run. However, Fitzgerald added a run in the sixth for a 5-3 advantage. As he reflected on the

season and the outgoing seniors, Coach Bradburn is thrilled about the direction of the program, knowing they were on the verge of reaching the Elite 8 for the first time in 20 years.
