the Confederate Army. Uncle Billy refused. So, the Home Guard hung Uncle Billy and left him for dead. Soon Uncle Billy's son found him and cut him down. Somehow Uncle Billy lived through the ordeal. A few months later the Home Guard came back and found Uncle Billy still alive and still adamant about not joining the war. Uncle Billy was hung a second time and lived through the hanging again. After the second hanging Uncle Billy lived another 30 years although he always had a crook in his neck.

Uncle Billy became the poster boy for resistance in Winston County. Although the Home Guard was in control most of the men of Winston County enlisted with the north. Wyatt and his brother, Absolem, enlisted with the 2nd Tennessee Mounted Infantry in Savannah, TN. Absolem never came home from the war. He died from dysentery. Wyatt came home to a community torn in half as a result of the war.

The men who hung Uncle Billy were hunted down and killed (in horrid fashion). Other men who sided with the south were tracked all the way to Oklahoma and killed. Of course all these killings were without judge or jury. Wyatt came home and found his wife and young family struggling. When he saw what had happened to his community he moved his family to western Tennessee and where he lived out his days. However, his oldest son John never forgot Winston and Franklin County and he came home to the mountains of north Alabama in the late 1870s.

As many of you know the Farmers Market will open on June 7th and we have many activities planned for your enjoyment on that day as well as many others. But, before the opening the Strawberry Festival will be held on May 24. I have talked with many of our growers and expect to see locally grown strawberries at the market on that day. potential tax liability for their Social Security benefits. This was not changed, in any way, by the 1993 law. However, of the 18.2 percent already subject to potential taxation, 10.6 percent saw their potential tax liability increase, while the remaining 7.6 percent suffered no change."

Mr. Adams also credited President Carter with granting immigrants SS at age 65 without paying into the system. However, according to the SS Administration: "Neither immigrants nor anyone else is able to collect Social Security benefits without someone paying Social Security payroll taxes into the system." They go on to clarify the apparent confusion on this issue: "The question confuses the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program with Social Security. SSI is a federal welfare program and no contributions. from immigrants or citizens or anyone else, is required for eligibility. Under certain conditions, immigrants can qualify for SSI benefits. The SSI program was an initiative of the Nixon Administration and was signed into law by President Nixon on October 30, 1972."
