# Strawberry shortage at Jubilee

Berry lovers looking to get their hands on the season's last crop of strawberries at the Union County Farmers Market had to act quickly at the 2015 Strawberry Jubilee on Saturday, May 23.

Reports from those in attendance indicated that the juicy red berries were sold out in as few as five minutes from the opening of the day.

"This year, our strawberries are earlier than normal because of all the hot weather we had," said Market Manager Mickey Cummings. "We're right at the tail end of strawberry season right now, and we sold out early today because of that. That's just the way it worked out. We may have to move it a little earlier next year.'

The Jubilee takes place annually and, along with Ramp Day, acts as a way to fine-tune Market operations prior to opening the Market for the summer season on June 6. "We chose strawber-

ries because everybody loves to come and get strawberries, and they're getting ripe typically toward the middle to late May," Cummings said.



Another factor that contributed in the quick sale of all the strawberries was the level of activity around Union County over the weekend.

The Spring Arts and Crafts Festival had taken over the Downtown area, and Saturday played host to the annual Memorial Day Parade and service that followed at the Union County War Memorial, bringing in crowds of people early.

Farmers know all too well that Mother Nature can be both fickle and favoring, and calling the date of the Jubilee, well, "it's a gamble every year," as Cummings put it.
