

Union County athletics take a leap forward in 2013-14

The past 10 months have been one heck of a ride for the diehard sports fans in Union County. Years from now, when reminiscing and rehashing the glory days, the 2013-14 school year could go down in history as the

year that traditions were born, winning began to snowball and success was becoming contagious.

Nearly every team at Union County High School made it beyond Region play and Woody Gap tennis reached State for the second consecutive year.

And from the looks of things, these young Panthers and Falcons show no signs of letting up in the near future. Underclassmen were the majority in almost every sport during 2013-14.

Union County High School would finally see a track program come to fruition under the tutelage of Coach Shawnetta Reece. Despite only attending one meet regular season meet, Union County had an impressive showing at Region and Sectionals, to springboard the upstart program into the State meet in Albany.

Sports would open in August and the Panther football team reached the State for the first time in 12 years. However, State competition was nothing new for the Lady Panthers softball team and Union County Cross Country. Both sports were dominated by underclassmen and appear to have raised the bar going into this fall.

With just two seniors and a skilled crop of freshman, the softball team reached State for the fifth consecutive season and both Cross Country squads returned to Carrollton where sophomore Emma Garrison made it 2-for-2 at the State Meet, claiming Union County's third Cross Country State Championship and eighth State title overall.

Just like the fall, the winter time saw Union extend another streak while putting an end to a drought.

The Panthers basketball squad and first-year Head Coach Casey Jones returned to the State Tournament following a five-year absence. Union relied heavily on a deep junior class that had some headaches early but came together in time for the 8-AA playoffs.

On the other hand, the Lady Panthers were making their fourth consecutive trip to State and their sixth in seven years. Like the guys, the gals also featured a deep junior

As springtime approached and temperatures began to rise, the expectations also rose for the Lady Panthers soccer team along with Panther baseball. Both squads had high hopes for 2014 and neither would disappoint.

Second-year Head Baseball Coach Brandon Bradburn lost eight key players from the 2013 Sweet 16 team but still managed to overcome some inconsistencies early on to also finish second in 8-AA.

They entered this season needing to replace more than 90 percent of its scoring from last year. In March, the Panthers fell to Towns County for the first time in the 18-year history of Union

With the school year almost over, 534 Union County Middle School students had wonderful adventures while hiking several miles on the famed Appalachian Trail (A.T.). On May 9, one hundred and fifty-eight 8th grade students and 15 teachers undertook the strenuous hike to the top of Blood Mountain under windy and cloudy skies. During the hike, they heard lessons about the A.T., invasive species, leave-no-trace, and the history of Blood Mountain and the unique A.T. Shelter at the summit that was built of stone by the Civilian Conservation Corps in 1937. During this hike, the students had the special experience of hiking up into a windblown cloud! On May 13, 191 6th grade students and 17 teachers hiked to the official start of the A.T. at the top of Springer Mountain from USFS Rd. 42. On the summit of Springer, they saw great views of the valley below, and listened to lessons about leave-no-trace and about Benton MacKaye, the "father" of the A.T. On the following Monday, one hundred and 85 7th grade students and 15 teachers hiked in small groups on the A.T. from Woody Gap north to Preaching Rock and south to Ram Rock Mountain. Before starting the Woody Gap hike, the students were told stories about Ranger Arthur Woody and his many contributions to the National Forests
