

four tribes home in September for their "We Are Still Here' memorial, a 10-foot tall bronze statue that will be unveiled at Meeks Park.

The four chiefs are: the Principal Chief of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians, the Chief of the United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians in Oklahoma, the Principal Chief of the Muscogee-Creek Nation, and the Principal Chief of the Cherokee Nation. Proceeds raised will be used for transportation and lodging for the chiefs.

"This is our first time (at the Farmers Market) and it's been quite successful so we'll probably do this again," said the TSNAI's Dana Nelson. "There has been a lot of interest created (for the cause) and we've even been invited to set up a tent at the Scottish Festival. There is connection between the Chero-



kees and the Scottish because they were here together and many of them knew and liked each other."

Another first-timer was Hayesville, NC's Walnut Hollow Ranch, whose premium, farm raised, Black Angus beef was a hit at the Farmers Market.

"It went well today and we met a lot of new people,"

said Farm Operator Charlie Katniss. "It was our first time here and we're going to be here for the season.'

Up next at the Market are the EGGS-travaganza on June 13 and the BBQ Blast on June 20. The Farmers Market will offer plenty to see and do through the late October with special events taking place every weekend through Oct. 31


