the Road Department know. Other non-emergency problems will be handled when they can. It requires another large crew just to trim trees and grind all the brush and we simply do not have the extra manpower to do this and the road ditches, so please be patient. However, if you have a problem, please call the Road Department so they can get it on their list.

Q. Our pavement needs to be repaved because it has all these patches on it and it does not look good.

A. Union County has some of the best roads of any county around. Just ask a UPS or FED X driver. We are doing a lot of patching on our roads because of the extreme cost of resurfacing. While the patch-ing may not look the best, the road surface is sound and safe. We are very proud of our road system where you will see very few cracks and alligator areas and should not see any pot holes. If you have a pot hole, always call the Road Dept. because we like to repair them immediately. Thanks for your patience. Road Department, (706) 439-6062. Commissioner's Office, (706) 439-6000.

Q. We heard the county is purchasing several pieces of real estate? Can you tell us what it is for and how we are paying for it?

A. The property is being purchased with SPLOST funds. We have under contract five acres across Butternut Creek from the Farmers Market. We are very excited about this as it will allow us to greatly expand parking, which will allow us to expand the facilities and usage in the future to try to keep up with demand. We are also purchasing 1.4 acres adjacent to the Fire Dept. at Station 1. We are currently negotiating on two other parcels with one under contract. All properties are adjacent to property already owned by the county. Prices are reasonable and it is an excellent opportunity to plan for the future of the county.

Q. I pay a lot of taxes and I don't think I get any value for what I pay. My road is not even mowed very often.

A. Unfortunately, we still hear this sentiment expressed occasionally. Over the next several weeks I will be using my Q & A column to inform you of all the many services your taxes are paying for in Union County.

I have written about this before, but it doesn't hurt to remind everyone. You may say, well, I don't use all of these services or I don't care about the new buildings and the trails at the park, I just want my road maintained. It is true that you may not use some of the services but still, many other people do, and you certainly want services such as emergency services and the fire department to be there for you in case you need them.

they were soaked in cold water

a minute. The flower vendors were extraordinary in their variety of cut flowers and the vibrancy of the colors. But you expect that out of Mother Nature's floral bouquet. What I wasn't prepared for was the variety of pastas, the multitude of shapes and the array of colors that they came in. Tomatoes came in over 50 varieties, shapes and sizes. Sweet peppers were close to the size of a football. Baskets of snails or almonds were nearly at every station.

It's hard not to grab to purchase nearly everything. The reality that you are living out of a suitcase, going from hotel room to hotel room, starts to set in.

Our next Market we hit for an extended visit was that of Sircusa, Sicily. Here we experienced nirvana in the form of a sample of warm, roasted and seasoned ricotta cheese. Who knew that you could roast the leftover cheese in the Sorrento container after you've made lasagna? We enjoyed samples of the hardest of parmigiana's speckled with peppercorns, to the soft goat cheeses made fresh daily, mounds of per-fectly shaped provolone balls, wrapped in rope, separating the cheeks of the cheese to look like a baby's sweet behind. They were piled on platters, decked on either side by heavily cured salamis and hams. Olives came in dozens of shapes and stages of cure. Dried herbs and spices (Sicily was an integral part of the Spice Route during the Middle Ages) could be purchased in bulk, but were also pre mixed for easy preparation per special Sicilian recipes. Sicilians like spices and have particular affinity for almond, jasmine, rosemary, mint and basil. Now I knew my passion for these I had gotten honestly.

The Markets I had the good fortune to visit were very similar to our Union County Farmers Market, in spirit, if not in produce and product. The vendors were like a family. They were proud of their goods and wares and wanted to be sure

and freshest quality possible. And lastly, the Markets are "meet and mingle" events just like our market. For those of you who attended the opening this past Saturday, you have got your vibe going. This summer, commit to being a part of each and every gathering. It's healthy to your body, your heart and your spirit!

Also, each Friday the Trash to Treasures Yard Sale is held at the Farmers Market from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m. Also, remember the Union County Canning Plant will open on Tuesday, July 9th at 6:30 a.m.

This spring has turned out to be wetter than normal and as a result we are seeing more plant diseases than usual. If you have apples or pears be prepared to deal with Fire Blight.

The disease symptoms cause dead brown twigs and leaves to hang on to the tree for a long time. Leaves and twigs look as if they have had a torch held under them. To slow down or stop the disease you should prune out dead tissue. Each time a pruning cut is made dip your shears in streptomyacin.

After pruning, spray your trees with streptomyacin. Make sure you follow label instructions on any pesticide vou use.
